AUTOS IN FAST RACES

LYTLE WINS THE FIRST.

Thomas Car Runs Mile a Minute Over Savannah Course.

[By Telegraph to The Tribune.] Savannah, March 18.—Herbert Lytle, of Vanderbilt Cup fame, won the 10-mile road race...

The course was policed by three hundred soldiers, sixty policemen and fifty flagmen. Lytle, after winning the race, praised the course and said that he would have been a better guard.

Never, perhaps, in any city in the world has greater enthusiasm been shown over such a kind of race. The Mayor was present, with other city officials, a master crowd lined the entire course...

Only three of the four cars scheduled for the opening contest started. The 40-horsepower Thomas-Detroit, entered by R. J. May, was withdrawn owing to the blowing out of a piston head.

The breaking down of the Pennsylvania in the first race after having led for 1 1/2 minutes 35 seconds over the Apperson gave the driver of the latter car clear sailing for the remainder of the race.

The cars were sent away at two minutes' intervals in both races. The Thomas car was first away in the second contest, but at the finish of the first lap the timing showed that the Apperson car had a lead of 40 seconds.

The fastest lap of the day came in the third circuit of the 10-mile course. Salzman drove at nearly the same pace, the time being 16.51. The time of the car by laps follows: 17.25, 17.02, 16.51, 16.00, 21.45, 17.37, 17.23, 19.23 and 18.45.

The Savannah course is a new one and is laid out in the sparsely settled suburbs southeast of the city. The width of the roads vary from 30 to 40 feet.
