

CAR TRANSFERS TO GO

U. S. COURT SO DECREES.

Big Loss in Exchange Between Third Avenue and Metropolitan.

There will be an extensive curtailment in the exchange of transfers between the lines of the Third Avenue Railroad Company and those of the Metropolitan...

Judge Lacombe issues his opinion on the facts presented by the receivers for the two systems, showing that transfers are a distinct loss to the owners of the two properties.

The duty of the receivers is obviously, Judge Lacombe says, to operate the roads to increase their earnings, and he agrees with the receivers that cutting down in the transfer privileges will assist materially to that end.

These transfers, Judge Lacombe finds that the state railroad law compels such issue where two roads contract to use in common their routes or any part thereof.

The transfer system will still be continued as between the Third Avenue road and the two others controlled by it, the Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railway Company...
