



WONT NAME DELEGATES GOV. HUGHES DECLINES.

Letter to Chairman Woodruff Made Public at Albany.

Albany, April 4.—Replying to a letter from State Chairman Woodruff asking his wishes as to the identity of the delegates-at-large from this state to the Republican National Convention, Governor Hughes declined positively to-day to express any preference. He declared that he did not care "to intervene in any way" and expressed the belief that the party's interests would be served best by the state convention assuming all responsibility for the identity of the delegates-at-large.

RIOT AT FOOTBALL GAME. Forty Hurt at England-Scotland Match—120,000 Present.

Glasgow, April 4.—One hundred and twenty thousand persons attended the football match between England and Scotland here to-day. A mob of a thousand broke into the enclosure, and forty persons were injured in the crush. During the progress of the game stones and bottles were thrown by angry spectators in the rear. Three of the injured persons were taken to the hospital.

A JOHNSON BROADSIDE.

Circular Letter an Unmistakable Attack on Mr. Bryan.

Chicago, April 4.—Governor Johnson's headquarters, in the Grand Pacific Hotel, in this city, fired the first broadside to-day in the war it has opened to prevent the nomination of William Jennings Bryan. On Monday hundreds of thousands of Democrats in the Middle West received individual letters pointing out that the nomination of Bryan at the Denver convention means certain defeat for the Democratic party and that the organization is drifting toward "an autocratic convention where a popular choice is to be subordinated to a personal will."

DELEGATES TO CHICAGO RETURNS UP TO DATE.

188 for Taft, 32 for Fairbanks, 36 for Cannon, 8 for Hughes and 34 Uncommitted.

Thirty-four delegates to the Republican National Convention to be held in Chicago on June 16 have been chosen since The Tribune's last summary of delegates elected was published, on March 30. Two hundred and ninety-eight delegates have now been chosen, a little less than a third of the membership of the convention, which was fixed in the Republican National Committee's call at 980. Delegates-at-large were elected during the week from Indiana and Porto Rico and fourteen district conventions were held—eight of them in Illinois. A notable feature of the week's elections was the choice of two delegates instructed for Mr. Taft in the 1st District of Illinois. Of the thirty-four delegates elected during the week Mr. Cannon got fourteen, Mr. Taft ten, Mr. Fairbanks four, Governor Hughes four and two were not instructed. Of the 298 delegates so far chosen 188 are instructed for Taft, thirty-six for Cannon, thirty-two for Fairbanks, twelve for Hughes and thirty-four are uninstructed. Contests in which Presidential preferences are involved are being made for thirty-two seats. Secretary Taft has the support of 63 per cent of the delegates so far elected.

INDIANA. The Indiana State Convention, held at Indianapolis on April 1 and 2, elected as delegates-at-large Senators Alfred J. Beveridge and James A. Hemenway, Governor J. Frank Hanly and James P. Goodrich, of Indianapolis. They were instructed for Fairbanks.

PORTO RICO. The Porto Rican convention, held at San Juan on March 29, elected as delegates-at-large Robert Todd and Francisco Quinones, both of San Juan. They were not instructed.

ILLINOIS. Sixteen district delegates were elected from Illinois.

The 1st District convention, held at Chicago on March 29, elected Chauncey Dewey and D. J. Schuyler, Jr., both of Chicago. They were instructed for Taft. They were instructed for holding a rival convention. The 4th District convention, held at Chicago on March 29, elected D. E. Shanahan and Swan Norman, both of Chicago. The 24th District convention, held at McLeansboro on April 2, elected W. Potter and J. B. Blackman. They were instructed for Cannon.

NEW YORK. Four district delegates were elected from New York.

The 25th District convention, held at Buffalo on April 2, elected Simon Seibert and John Grimm, Jr., both of Buffalo. They were instructed for Hughes. The 31st District convention, held at Buffalo on April 2, elected Fred Greiner and C. H. Timmerman, both of Buffalo. They were instructed for Hughes.

SEVENTEEN DISTRICTS. The 10th Virginia District convention, held at Staunton on March 31, elected R. A. Fulwiler, of Staunton, and William Jennings of Rockbridge County. They were instructed for Taft. The 3d West Virginia District convention, held at Hinton on April 2, elected W. S. Edwards, of Charleston, and C. Henry, of Fayetteville. They were instructed for Taft. The 5th Ohio District convention, held at Kenton on April 2, elected J. H. Miller, of Logan County, and W. R. Wilson, of Champlain County. They were instructed for Taft. The 9th Alabama District convention, held at Bay Minette on April 4, elected J. P. Dimmick and A. S. Watkins. They were instructed for Taft. They were instructed for Cannon and elected C. H. Scott and J. M. Green. They were not instructed.

Note.—Contents affecting Presidential preferences are being made for 32 of these 298 seats. Of the delegates affected twenty are credited to Taft—six in Alabama, four in Florida, four in Tennessee, four in Oklahoma and two in Ohio. Four are credited to Hughes—all in Missouri. Two are credited to Fairbanks—both in Kentucky. Six are uninstructed—two in Alabama, two in Mississippi and two in Missouri. Total membership of the convention is 1908, 950. Necessary to a choice, 601.

ERIE PROBLEM SOLVED. J. P. MORGAN TO RESCUE. Road to Issue \$15,000,000 of Three Year 6 Per Cent Secured Notes.

The outlook for the Erie Railroad Company took on a decidedly brighter aspect yesterday afternoon, when it was announced at the office of J. P. Morgan & Co. that the directors had authorized an issue of \$15,000,000 of three-year 6 per cent secured notes. Of this amount \$5,500,000 will be used to take up the unsecured short term notes which mature on Wednesday, while \$5,000,000 has been underwritten at par to provide cash for the needs of the company.

ARREST JURY FOREMAN. INDICTED NEWARK'S BOSS. James R. Nugent, Charging Conspiracy, Wants Sheriff Held, Too.

James R. Nugent, city counsel and Democratic leader of Newark, last night carried out a threat made in the Supreme Court in that city earlier in the day, when the Essex County Grand Jury handed to Chief Justice Gummere four indictments, each of which charged Nugent with misdemeanor in joining and conspiring with Philip Looser and others to procure persons to vote at the election of last year, knowing such persons to be not entitled to vote.

DIPLOMATIC DEADLOCK. CANADA STANDS FIRM. Insists on Mixed Commission to Settle Pending Questions.

Washington, April 4.—There are many indications that the negotiations between the United States and Great Britain, so far as they relate to the disposition of power from Niagara Falls and allied questions, have reached a deadlock which all the tact and diplomatic ability of Secretary Root and Ambassador Bryce will be unable to break. The insistence of the Canadians that this troublesome problem, together with a number of allied questions, such as boundary disputes, etc., shall be referred to a commission clothed with plenary powers precludes any possibility of an agreement by the United States, while all the tact of the British Ambassador seems impotent to wean the Canadian authorities from a scheme whereby, apparently, they had hoped to supplant the treaty-making power of the British Foreign Office with a mixed commission somewhat similar in character to the former Joint High Commission.

MANY SEE DEATH LEAP. Lecture Patrons Watch Aged Man Plunge from High Window.

By jumping from the third story window of the Temple Hall apartment house, at 121st street and Fifth avenue, yesterday afternoon, Benjamin Bernstein, sixty-five years old, a retired merchant, committed suicide. Several scores of men and women who had attended a lecture at the Temple Israel, 120th street and Lenox avenue, saw the man standing on the window sill and watched him leap to his death.

COLOMBIAN AGGRESSION. Occupation of Jurado Confirmed—Treaty Opposed.

Panama, April 4.—The Mayor of Chapigana, a town of Panama, near Jurado, to-day officially confirmed the report of the occupation of Jurado by the Colombians. There is a strong sentiment here at present against signing any treaty with Colombia. A prominent Panamanian said to-day:

Reading, Penn., April 4.—Jennie Van Vliet, of Kingston, N. Y., and Edward Major were arrested by the police here to-day, the woman disguised in male attire. The pair arrived in the city yesterday to manufacture and peddle harness dressing. Major is wanted by the authorities of Saugerties, N. Y., on the charge of horse stealing. Not until the pair fell into the hands of the police was the woman's sex revealed. She said she had been traveling in disguise for several weeks, saying she and her companion found this a more convenient and cheaper manner of traveling.
