COURT SUSTAINS HAHN. FOELKER STILL IN BED.

County Committee Cannot Unseat Delegate with Election Certificate.

Albany, June 2.—A county committee of a political organization has not the right to unseat delegates elected at primaries, if the delegates have received a certificate of election from a board of election.

The action was begun by the unseated delegates, headed by John J. Hahn, who secured an order directing that a peremptory writ of mandamus be issued to restore them to membership in the committee.

The delegates were unseated after the committee on contested elections of the county committee had reported that the election of Hahn and his colleagues was accompanied by "fraud, bribery and intimidation."

WANT CUBA TO BUILD WATERWORKS.

White House Conference on Cienfuegos Matter—Taft to Draw Up Proposal.

Washington, June 2.—After a long conference at the White House to-day between the President, Secretaries Root and Taft, General Edwards and Colonel McIntyre, of the Insular Bureau, it was announced that Secretary Taft would draw up a proposal for submission to the proper Cuban authorities that the Cuban government should construct the Cienfuegos waterworks.

ASKS ARREST OF BAILEY.

State Department Wants Honduras to Allow His Extradition.

Washington, June 2.—As an act of courtesy and comity, there being no extradition treaty between the two countries, the State Department has asked the Honduran authorities to arrest and extradite F. G. Bailey, the president of the Export Shipping Company, who is wanted to answer a charge of secreting and withholding from the receiver of the company certain goods and merchandise.
