


ATLANTIC CITY'S MANY AMUSEMENTS

Talk of a Luna Park—Additional Railroad Trains—Y. M. C. A. to Build a Gymnasium.


Atlantic City, June 8.—There will be no lack of amusement for patrons of this resort during the present season. Besides the piers, with their bands, skating rinks, auction shop and the regular theatre, other amusements are springing up along the beach front like mushrooms on a summer day. There are some half dozen new enterprises in the nature of small theatres, and these will be ready to open about the middle of June. The most pretentious of the new enterprises will be that which is to be erected on the site of the old Hippodrome in Arkansas avenue, which will house a spectacular production of "Creation." The promoters hope to open it about the middle of July.

The comfort of motorists in the building of a system of good roads. Ideal motor tours from New York to the White Mountains over fine roads and through fine scenery have been made possible by the co-operation of some of the largest and most popular of the New England hotels, and provision is made for a first class hotel at the end of each day's run.

Erie are a number of important cities, of which Cleveland and Buffalo are the chief.

The great fashionable hotels, the small, cosy, homelike ones, the farmhouses and the cottages have all been doing their annual spring housecleaning and many improvements are to be chronicled each year, for the hotel men of the White Mountains are so progressive that they are not satisfied to have their houses and grounds "just as good as so-and-so's"—they want them just a little better. The result is with all this friendly rivalry that the resorts of the White Mountains are spick and span and immaculate when their doors are thrown open for the summer season.

It is from the latter city, the second in size in the Empire State, that the start on the trip up the lakes is made. Lake Ontario not being included in it owing to the barriers interposed by Niagara Falls in the river which connects it with Lake Erie. The Northern Steamship Company, of Buffalo, has made the lake trip most enjoyable by putting in commission the two great steamers, the North West and the North Land, which are equipped with every means of comfort and luxury that can conduce to the wellbeing of those who voyage on them. They ply between Buffalo and Chicago on the waters of Lakes Erie, Huron, St. Clair and Michigan, through a thousand miles of varied and beautiful scenery and delightful surroundings. At Mackinac Island they connect with another steamer, which makes the trip up Lake Superior to Duluth.

At Bretton Woods the Mount Washington and the Mount Pleasant will enter to their usual high class of patronage. The Bretton Woods golf course has eighteen snappy holes of general sportiness. Bretton Woods is really the geographical centre of the White Mountains, and the terminations of the historic motor endurance runs and the Golden Tours have been at this point, from which the most delightful side trips may be made by motor to all parts of the mountains. Over one hundred cars may be accommodated in the Bretton Woods garages. Hardly a hotel in the White Mountains, large or small, is now without its own garage.

No visitor to Buffalo intending to take the lake trip fails to see the sights of that city and to take a trip to Niagara Falls and down the Gorge Railway. After the start up Lake Erie from Buffalo the waterside resorts, popular with the residents of that city, are passed, and after a night's ride Cleveland, the metropolis of Ohio, is reached. After leaving that port Put-In-Bay, with its historic memories, is soon passed, and then the Detroit River is entered, the passage of which has much picturesque interest. It is the boundary between this country and our northern neighbor, and opposite Detroit City is Windsor, Canada. The Michigan metropolis is called "The City of the Straits," and one of the most attractive features is Belle Isle Park, in the river, to which landscape gardening has given the utmost charm.

The next body of water is Lake St. Clair, one of the features of which is the famous St. Clair Flats, on which are thousands of summer homes, clubhouses and resort hotels, another Venice, with canals for streets. Up Lake Huron takes fourteen hours until Mackinac Island is reached, with many natural attractions and special features. From this point the trip to Chicago is on the waters of Lake Michigan, with stops at several interesting points besides at Milwaukee, the Cream City, famed for its mammoth breweries. The attractions of Chicago for the visitor from the East are many and varied, and as much time as one desires may be spent in enjoying them before the return trip is begun.

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One of the most elaborate cottages in the city is that now occupied by Captain and Mrs. John L. Young, on the new million dollar pier. It is built of concrete, like the pier itself. It is roomy, its decorations are unusually elaborate. A large lawn surrounds the cottage, broken here and there with beds of flowers. It is rather a strange sight, a veritable oasis in a desert of water. It is brilliantly lighted with electricity, the current being furnished by the plant on the pier. The outside of the cottage is outlined with thousands of electric lights, and at night reads one of some of the ornate buildings seen at Coney Island.

Residents of States avenue formed themselves into the States Avenue Improvement Association, and they intend spending a great deal of money in making the block between the beach and Pacific avenue one of the prettiest pieces of street in the world. They have made beautiful lawns, planted trees, and are contemplating erecting decorative iron posts at the Pacific avenue intersection, on which they will place ornate electric lamps. Many of the handsome cottages in this street are owned by wealthy Philadelphians, among them Senator James McNichol, Alfred Berke, George Berke and Louis Donnelly.

The improvements that are being made in paving the streets are being carried into the county by the Board of Freeholders, and in a comparatively short time Atlantic City and county will be the haven for the motorist. The roads are now in better condition than at any time in the last five years. There is one bad place still in the Meadow Boulevard, and that is near the Atlantic City end of the road. This, the freeholders say, will be repaired next week.

Atlantic City has somewhere in the neighborhood of nine hundred hotels, including the larger boarding houses. During the height of the season these houses shelter nearly a quarter of a million visitors. In the summer there is hardly room enough on the boardwalk, especially in the heart of the resort, to move along with comfort. The boardwalk police divide the crowd at the centre of the sixty-foot wide structure, and keep a stream of people moving in either direction.
