ECONOMY OF HOSPITAL SHIPS.—The surgeon eneral of the navy has found it possible to make a material reduction in the amount of space which has been hitherto allotted to the care of the sick and injured of ships of war. The percentage of space used for what is known as sick bays on naval ships has contemplated accommodations in some instances of four for every one hundred men of the crew. It is now believed that with the advent of the hospital ships and the facilities which will exist in time of war of transporting the injured to the hospitals on shore it is possible to reduce the space hitherto given up to the hospital section on a warship, and the accommodations have been reduced by one-half in most instances, so that on the battleships which are now about to be constructed, and one of which is to be built at the Brooklyn navy yard, the sick bay will consist of from eighteen to twenty cots. This gives an op-portunity of more space in the living quarters of the crew, and is considered of greater advantage than the use of the space for the small fraction of men who require hospital attention, which class is hereafter to be accommodated on the hospital ship. one of which, it is expected, will ultimately be attached to each fleet or cruising and independent




