NEW THOMAS MODELS.

Lightweight Six Cylinder Car Designed After Long Study.

It was announced yesterday by the E. R. Thomas Motor Company that its engineers, who have been working hard for some time on a perfect score of reducing the weight of the automobile, had at last succeeded. They have produced a six cylinder car which will carry six passengers without crowding—all in individual seats facing forward—which weighs complete, without gasoline, water, lubricating oil or extra parts, two thousand pounds. The average automobile weighs five or six times its passenger capacity, but this new car, which is to be known as the Model L, 6-4, Thomas Flyer, weighs little more than twice its passenger capacity.
