BEGIN TARIFF REVISION SUB-COMMITTEE MEETS.

Will Gather Much Information for Use of Congress.

Washington, Aug. 24.—Tariff revision was actually begun at the Capitol to-day, when a Senate sub-committee on the tariff, headed by Senator Burrows, of Michigan...

The sub-committee which met this morning is one of the three authorized by the Senate to sit during the recess and directed to deal with preliminary questions relating to the tariff.

The first sub-committee, composed of Senators Aldrich, Hale, Daniel and Teller, was commissioned to investigate the foreign markets of the United States, to study the tariff methods in many of the larger nations...

The duty of the committee which met this morning is to look into the matter of the administrative sections of the customs laws and the classification of the merchandise...

It is the intention of the members of these sub-committees, said Senator Burrows, "to begin this revision in a businesslike and practical manner. The Republican platform pledged the party to a revision of the tariff, which would be thorough and sane."

CALLS MURPHY A LIAR. M'CARREN'S HOT REPLY.

Says Tammany Chief as Moralizer Would Make "a Horse Laugh."

"Long Pat" McCarren, the outwaded leader of Brooklyn Democrats, issued a statement yesterday in reply to the one made by Charles F. Murphy in the morning papers.

Regarding the statement issued by Mr. Murphy this morning, in which he says that the real reason for his antagonism to me personally is due to the fact that I have been instrumental in preventing the growth of red light institutions...

The charge that I have been outwaded by the Democratic State Convention is true, so far as Mr. Murphy could outwade me and all the other delegates from Brooklyn...

It was pointed out in political circles that Haggerty and the others mentioned as dismissed through Murphy's influence for the welfare of Brooklyn were dismissed at a time when Murphy was making a fight against McCarren to get control of the Brooklyn organization...

"Murphy ought to know that he can't fool Brooklyn Democrats with any such stuff as that," said McCarren while he was preparing a reply.
