

FOR THE BUSY MAN

Constant Reader Tells He Missed in Last Week's Papers.

POLITICIAN LOSES JOB.

"Archibald D. Sanders, Collector of Internal Revenue for the Western District of New York, was removed from office by President Roosevelt for 'pernicious activity' in helping John A. Merritt, Collector of the Port of Buffalo, defeat Congressman Porter's renomination in Niagara County. It was reported that the President had warned Sanders and Collector Merritt also not to take part in the fight.

NEWPORT.

Newport, R. I., Aug. 29.—With the national lawn tennis tournament over and the three polo tournaments ended, there is little left of the Newport fixture season. There will be a brief rest, and then the field will be open for the last and, no doubt, the largest feature of the season, the horse show, which will take place, as usual, at the Casino, beginning on September 7.

TARIFF REVISION.

"Senator Hopkins, one of the tariff revision commissioners, announced after a conference with Mr. Taft, at Hot Springs, Ark., that the revised tariff bill would contain maximum and minimum rates whereby the same results which it was sought to attain by the reciprocity feature of the Dingley bill—namely, special concessions for American goods in foreign markets—would be brought about without the obstacles encountered in the Senate whenever ratification of a reciprocity treaty was requested. The general rates imposed on imports from all countries with which no special terms are made will be the maximum, while a lower set of rates will be provided which may be made applicable to imports from any country making special concessions on American goods. In many schedules there would be material reductions of the tariff.

STAMPS PUT TO AN ODD USE.

When Robert Blanken, of Philadelphia, retires he goes to sleep in a bed which, outside of the value of wood, is worth in the neighborhood of \$2,500. He keeps his collars, shirts and other apparel in a bureau worth probably \$1,000. The table by which he sits as he reads or studies in the evening he values at something like \$75.

WALL STREET INVESTIGATION.

"The governing committee of the Stock Exchange began an investigation of the deal in which over a million shares were sold. It was alleged that a large part of these sales were 'match' sales—that is, sales in which the securities were sold to one firm, A. O. Brown & Co., which denied making any 'match' sales. Some brokers accredited to the exchange, including Thomas W. Law, who was followed by the suspension of a petition in involuntary bankruptcy against them and a request for the appointment of a receiver by creditors to the amount of \$200,000. The firm declared that it was being treated unfairly, and that its suspension had been due to the failure of a bank to lend it \$7,000,000 on good security. The firm had been short in the market and had demoralized prices through its selling orders.
