

ONE TENEMENT BODY ARCHITECTS URGE IT.

Plan to Merge Buildings Bureau Beiltied, However.

The Society of Architects, a Brooklyn organization, has submitted to the tenement house commission...

The Society of Architects submitted a similar brief containing the same grievances to the Charter Commission last year...

The communication was shown yesterday to Edmund J. Butler, the present Tenement House Commissioner...

"Per instance, this department, when a new tenement house is to be erected, must see to it that certain sanitary and safety devices are installed...

"But the bureau's function ends with the completion of the house, while our duties with respect to that building have only just begun...

"I see that these architects complain in their communication that a new application form submitted by them and approved by me last December has not yet come into use...

Robert W. de Forest, who was the first Tenement House Commissioner under the new law, said that the points raised by the Society of Architects related entirely to questions of administration...

"Before the creation of the Tenement House Department when the Bureau of Buildings had charge of enforcing the tenement regulations...

Lawrence Veller, who was First Deputy Tenement House Commissioner under Mr. De Forest and was also a member of the Tenement House Commission which drew up the law...

"Ever since the Tenement House Department was created, in 1907," he said, "attempts have been made from time to time, by small groups of individuals who have grievances because of their experience with the department, to abolish it...

"I should say that the whole situation could be summed up in the fact that a small group of men in the city find that they cannot do business with as much ease in the Tenement House Department as they can in the Bureau of Buildings in the old days...



JEWISH NEW YEAR NEAR.

Celebrations Will Begin at Sunset September 25—Hours of Service.

The Jewish New Year will begin on the evening, at sunset, of September 25. According to the Jewish reckoning it will be the year 5668, and the year will close on September 15, 1909.

Besides the free synagogues there are many halls and lodge rooms in the Jewish quarter, east of the Bowery and in Harlem, where services will be held on New Year's Day and the succeeding holidays.

The Spanish and Portuguese synagogue in Central Park West and 72d street, over which the Rev. Dr. H. Pereira Mendes presides, has arranged to hold services in the schoolroom of the synagogue, where Moses Guedalia will officiate...

At the Temple Emanuel and all the Reform houses of worship services will be held on the evening of September 25 at 8:30 o'clock, and on September 26 at 9 a. m., under the leadership of their rabbis.

At the Temple Emanuel, Dr. Silverman and Magner, both of 9th street and 11th avenue, the Rev. Dr. H. Grossman, Israel congregation, Harlem, the Rev. Dr. Maurice H. Harris, at the Free Synagogue, where services will be conducted by the Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise.

At the orthodox synagogues there will be services at the same hours, and also on September 27. The Rev. Dr. H. P. Mendes and Dr. Pool will officiate at the Spanish and Portuguese synagogues, and the Rev. Dr. F. de Sola Mendes at Shear, Tetlow, in 82d street, near Amsterdam avenue.

HARDER TO SAVE WOMEN.

Dummies of Men Easily Rescued at Schenectady Fender Tests.

Although only a dozen of the forty fenders and wheel guards designed to prevent accident and loss of life on trolley tracks were tried out in the tests held under the direction of the Public Service Commission at the General Electric Company plant in Schenectady during last week, the tests have gone on an elaborate scale.

Some interesting facts were brought out during the tests. In one where the dummy of the man was picked up by a fender the dress on that of the woman was caught by a corner of the fender and the figure dragged along beside the car.

Mr. Wright's invention consists of a swinging board carried beneath the front of the car. As soon as the board hits an obstacle the wheel guard, which, when in ordinary position, is about three inches above the rails, drops automatically to the ground, preventing the obstacle from coming into contact with the wheels.

THE MALONEY MARRIAGE. Church May Annul It for "Lack of True Consent."

Philadelphia, Sept. 19.—Among Catholics in this city great interest is being manifested regarding the action of the Church tribunal at Rome on the question of an annulment of the marriage of Arthur Osborne and Helen Maloney, now before it.

"The Catholic Church legislates for the conscience of its own subjects," said a prominent Catholic. "Her tribunals never accept the verdict of a civil tribunal as final. But from the testimony taken before the referee who granted a decree of divorce in New York it appears that Miss Maloney did not give a true consent in the marriage with Osborne."

"If Helen Maloney consented to marry with the idea that a later performance of a religious ceremony was necessary for the validity of the marriage, then in the eyes of the Church there was no marriage. There appears to be a lack of true consent, which is sufficient grounds for the annulment of the marriage."

OLD KEEPER TO RESCUE.

At Once Calms Rebellious Elephant in Bronx Park.

The sight of her former keeper, "Dick" Richards, caused Luna, the big female elephant, to forget yesterday afternoon that she had for twenty-four hours terrified Director Hornaday and the keepers at the Bronx Zoological Gardens.

Prior to Richards' arrival at the park Luna was stirring things up, and with the exception of nearly a score of keepers who remained on guard with forks and combination whips, which have hooks attached, the crowd, which numbered several hundred, kept at a safe distance.

Following Richards' arrival, more than a score of keepers, under his supervision, succeeded in getting Luna up. It was evident that she was none too anxious. Again Richards told her it was time she got over her madness. Then she arose as gently as if nothing had been the matter with her.

Luna came to the park a week ago yesterday. While at Luna Park she had been as peaceful an elephant as might well be imagined. During her two years at the park she was a friend of children and used to crowd. But the babel of sounds from the Bronx jangle had her on edge soon after she was put into the antelope enclosure with old Gunda.

Although her actions did not suit her keeper, Richards, yet he decided Friday afternoon to take her out and introduce her to the children, believing that would have some effect on her.

At a late hour last night it was learned that Luna was again the peaceful animal that she was at Luna Park. It is understood that Richards will remain with her at least a fortnight, until she becomes accustomed to her surroundings.
