

ROBERTSON WINS BIG AUTO RACE SMASHES EVERY RECORD IN FLYING CAR.

Hot Fight for Second Place Won by Lozier Car After Daring Spurt by Thomas.

A cheering crowd greeted the finish of the twenty-four-hour automobile race of the Motor Racing Association at Brighton Beach track last night when the Simplex car, driven by George Robertson, scooped past the grandstand at 10:30 o'clock, with 1,179 miles to its credit.

After the big race was over, the summing up of its effects showed that one man had been killed and five injured. The property loss was represented in the smashing of half a dozen valuable cars.

Following the accidents of the first few hours' racing, a crowd of perhaps one thousand had gathered at the course, despite the cold wind and the drizzle.


NEW YORK WINS FIRST GAME.

Yale's 20-yard mark was reached, Banks twisting past the Yale right wing with a puzzling quarter-back and Stein left, quick try for a place goal, kicked short. Coy punted to midfield, but the Syracuse backs drove the ball back by smashing aliens.

SEEKING SONDER YACHTS.

For the purpose of making the next German-American race of the sonderklasse boats of greater national importance than the last one, the Eastern Yacht Club's committee is sending letters to the commodores of the principal yacht clubs of the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and to the Great Lakes, asking them to submit the conditions to their members, with the hope that each club will build a boat to compete in the trial races which take place off Marblehead in August.

Two of these matches have been sailed. The first was won by the American boat Vim, and the second by a German boat. Next year's match, which begins off Marblehead on August 26, will, it is thought, be more keenly contested than either of its predecessors. According to the conditions, American boats must not cost more than \$2,000 with two sets of sails, and they must not weigh less than 4,000 pounds. The Germans will send three boats to meet the three chosen to represent America.

Amherst, Mass., Oct. 3.—Fordham took the first game of the Amherst season from the home team this afternoon by a score of 5 to 0. The New York team scored its touchdown in the first three minutes of play. White, of Fordham, received the ball at the kick-off and in a brilliant run carried the ball forty-five yards. A forward pass, Gargan to McCaffrey, netted twelve yards, and White then went around left end for a touch-down.

The long end run of the game, the runners repeatedly tearing off thirty yards at a time, Amherst played well on the offense, but only came within ten yards of Fordham's goal, the latter holding them for downs.

CRIMSON BEATS MAINE

Harvard Scores Three Touchdowns by Hard Line Plunging.

(By Telegraph to The Tribune.) Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 3.—Harvard defeated a weak team from the University of Maine this afternoon in the Stadium by the one-sided score of 16 to 0. Cutler, the new Crimson quarterback, depended almost entirely on line plunging and end runs for his gains. A successful forward pass and an on-side kick were directly responsible for the first two touchdowns.

The third score came toward the end of the game, when the "subs" were in the Crimson lineup. Harvard kicked off to Maine, who tried the line for no gain and returned the ball to Corbett on the Crimson's 50-yard line. On the first rush Corbett made ten yards at right end. Then Cutler worked the forward pass to Crowley for ten more yards and short gains through the line by Smith and Kennard to the 1-yard line. Corbett hit left tackle for a slight gain and went in again, slipping off left tackle and over the goal line. McKay failed at goal.

The second touchdown came at the end of the first half, after the piskin had been carried from the middle of the field by 10-yard end runs by Corbett, an on-side kick to Crowley for fifteen yards and short gains through the line by Smith and Kennard to the 1-yard line. Corbett hit left tackle for a slight gain and went in again, slipping off left tackle and over the goal line. McKay failed at goal.

Substitutes were sent in for the Crimson in the second half, and toward the end of the half White plugged the weak Maine line and got through for a touchdown. Dunlap, who went in for Hoar, failed to kick a goal. The game ended with the ball in Harvard's possession on their 24-yard line.
