The suffragettes suffered a second legal defeat yesterday when Justice Breen, in the Harlem po lice court, dismissed their case against Walter Bunnell, the election inspector whom they had arrested on the charge of illegal voting. But they are not discouraged, and say that this, like their registration case, will be heard from later.

J., but maintained the his voting residence is No. 317 West 136th street, from which he registered. Mr. Bunnell testified that the property in question belonged to his mother, and that it had been leased to the present occupant, who is using it as a sanatorium, on the condition that he should be allowed to maintain a voting residence there.
