

VOTE IN CITY SHOWS THE FEAR OF BRYAN

PLURALITY FOR TAFT INCREASED TO 15,645.

Chandler Got 20 Per Cent Less in New York than Did Hearst. Two Years Ago.

Study of the figures on President and Governor in this city would seem to show the growing independence of the voters. Veteran political leaders yesterday declared they could not account for the result in any other way.

Chairman Mack, of the Democratic National Committee, and Chairman Conners, of the state committee, despite the report of defection among the rank and file, absolve both Charles F. Murphy, of Tammany Hall, and Senator McCarren, of Brooklyn, from any charge of treachery, and yet Bryan's plurality in Manhattan and the Bronx was less than 6,000, while he lost Brooklyn by more than 23,000.

Leaders say that the big vote for Taft in this city is due to a large extent to the business men, who believed that Bryan was an unsafe man. They voted on their conviction, and Democratic party affiliations were thrown to the winds.

Taft made big gains in Queens, the Bryan plurality there being only 1,633, as compared to some 4,000 for Parker four years ago.

In Manhattan the Sullivan districts below 14th street gave the normal Democratic pluralities for both Bryan and Chandler, but the Democratic vote in the Bronx fell off marvellously, much to the dismay of the leaders. Taft carried the 25th District there by some 300.

The best residential sections in the city showed a large vote for Governor Hughes, indicating that his policies were strongly upheld by that class in the community. The Chandler vote in the districts in Kings County, in which the race-track influence was felt, was to a large degree responsible for even the small pluralities the Democratic candidate for Governor got there.

The Independence party vote on President in the city appears to be about 27,500, which is considerably below what most people expected. Shearn led the ticket, with a vote of 33,453.

It would seem that the Socialist party had about doubled its vote of four years ago from an estimate based on fragmentary returns.

Judge Taft's plurality over Mr. Bryan in the greater city was 15,645. The incomplete returns of Tuesday night gave the Republican candidate a plurality of 9,378. The vote was, for Taft, 390,574; for Bryan, 284,929, or a total of the two candidates of 675,503.

Bryan's plurality in Manhattan and the Bronx was only 5,802, in Queens 1,038, and in Richmond 600. Judge Taft offset these in Brooklyn and had 15,645 to spare. The vote for the two parties for President showed a falling off from the result of 1904, when the total was 619,390, or 33,887 more than was cast Tuesday; in 1904 the vote was also larger, being 590,917, or 4,114 in excess of the total vote in the last election.

Completed returns from the 1,633 election districts in the greater city show only a comparatively slight change from the plurality for Chandler as estimated in yesterday's Tribune. The Democratic candidate just managed to nose out of the greater city with a plurality of 60,288, a gain of only 1,600 votes over the figures given yesterday. The revised figures show increases in the plurality for Chandler in Manhattan and the Bronx and in Richmond and a falling off in Brooklyn and Queens. His plurality in New York County was 49,935; in Kings, 4,368; in Queens, 5,908, and in Richmond, 1,417; a total of 60,288. With the single exception of Richmond, Hearst rolled up a greater vote in every borough when he ran as the candidate of the Democratic and Independence League parties for Governor in 1906. Herrick's plurality over Hughes in 1904 in the greater city was 79,732.

All the other Democratic candidates on the state ticket ran considerably behind Chandler, Controller Glynn, who was renominated to succeed himself, coming nearest to the Lieutenant Governor in the size of his plurality in the greater city over his chief opponent, Mayor Gaus of Albany. In Manhattan Glynn ran less than 7,000 votes behind Chandler, but defections in the other boroughs brought down the total of his plurality to 46,816.

Samuel S. Koenig, the Republican candidate for Secretary of State and leader of the 6th Assembly District, made a fine run throughout the city, and despite the reputed strength with the labor element of the present incumbent of the office, John S. Whalen, he won 29,542 votes behind after the count had been revised. In Kings County George M. Palmer, the present minority leader in the Assembly and Democratic candidate for Attorney General, got a plurality almost twice as great as that of Chandler, getting a total vote of more than 2,500 above that cast for the head of the ticket. In fact, Controller Glynn was the only one of Mr. Chandler's associates on the ticket in the borough across the bridge who failed to get either as large a number of votes or as great a plurality as the candidate for Governor.

In Richmond, Philip P. Farley, candidate for Engineer and Surveyor, was the only Democratic candidate for a state office who failed to get as good a lead as Chandler, and he had an even 1,400, only seventeen less than the plurality for the head of the ticket.

In Queens, on the other hand, Chandler got more votes and a larger plurality than any of his associates. His plurality was 5,908, as against 7,894 for Hearst over Hughes in 1906.

MACK LOOKING AHEAD BRYAN FOR THE SENATE.

South Sees Notice That It Wants Next Candidate.

Considerable contrast was shown yesterday at the Republican and Democratic national headquarters. In the case of the Republican party, the chief of the party, John S. Whalen, was still laboring with the result, while at the Hoffman House Chairman Mack was trying to figure out how it all happened.

Mr. Mack does not believe that Mr. Bryan will be a candidate for President again. He has not lost his faith in the Nebraska, and believes he had a splendid fight under the circumstances, but that he should not be put forward as a candidate for the next Presidential campaign.

Several Southern leaders visited Chairman Mack yesterday and served notice on him that they wanted a Southern man for the Presidential candidate in 1912. In substance they said to him: "We have had a Western man, we have had an Eastern man, but the Democratic party does not seem to be able to win. FUTURE OF M'CARREN.

Brooklyn Politicians Say His Usefulness as Leader Has Ended.

All over Brooklyn yesterday men were predicting that one result of the election would be the political downfall of Senator McCarren. The success of Justice Blackmar, the Republican candidate for the Supreme Court, over Samuel S. Whitehouse, Senator McCarren's personal counsel, was taken as indicating a strong change of feeling in the rank and file of the voters as to their present leader's fitness to continue in charge. In Kings County, which is normally at least 30,000 Democratic, Mr. Blackmar received a plurality of 15,362—just about \$100 more than was expected.

It is expected that Whitehouse has been defeated as a judicial candidate three times.

All Senator McCarren would say yesterday was, "I am sorry."

Some will believe this and some will not, the latter class holding him responsible for much of the cutting in the county resulting in its loss to the Democrats. Ex-Sheriff Melody expressed the prevailing opinion of the anti-McCarren men when he said yesterday: "He has scored five successive defeats in five years. Kings County, which is normally Democratic by 20,000, has elected a Republican. If he is continued as a leader, this borough will become a Republican stronghold."

One of the features of the election was the success of the candidates opposed by the women teachers because they had refused to vote for the equal pay bill. Senator Eugene M. Davis, of the 6th District, received a plurality of 3,827, about three times as large as two years ago. Assemblyman Warren L. Lee, of the 18th District, received a plurality of 3,350, which is a thousand more than last year. Assemblymen Charles F. Murphy, William W. Coine and George A. Green were re-elected by big pluralities.
