

TO FIGHT COURT DELAY

P. S. BOARD STANDS FIRM.

Does Not Believe Writ of Certiorari Hold in Transfer Case.

The Public Service Commission served police yesterday on the Metropolitan Street Railway Company and the Central Park, North & East River Railroad Company...

As the commission's counsel figure out the case, the certiorari is not the proper legal remedy for the company in this situation...

The Nassau Electric Railroad Company, a subsidiary of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, was yesterday ordered by the commission...

With Frederick W. Whitridge, receiver, on the stand, the commission yesterday held a hearing on its proposed order to the Third Avenue system...

Before Mr. Whitridge took the stand William H. Miller, who was the controller of Superintendent Robertson of the Third Avenue line, testified that in 1899 the motive power of that line was changed from cable to electricity...

"How did you find the road?" asked John M. Towers, counsel for the Central Park and East River Railroad Company...

"I expected to find a going road, and found one about gone," replied the receiver. He said that when he took charge he found 554 cars, "mostly derelict" while in the office were no tables or chairs...

"When your commission first began to show down orders on me," he said, "I told it how absurd and conditions were, and that I was trying to build up a road..."

Similar conditions prevailed, he said, on the Forty-second Street, Manhattanville and St. Nicholas Avenue Railroad, controlled by the Third Avenue. The "short line" from Amsterdam Avenue to Riverside Drive had "one car, two horses, one driver, one conductor and two regular passengers..."

CURATES GET MORE PAY

MINIMUM SALARY \$1,200.

Diocesan Convention Levies New Tax to Make Increase.

Many a struggling curate will bless the 1908 convention of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New York, which adopted unanimously yesterday a resolution that the minimum salary for an unmarried clergyman in the diocese should be \$1,200 and for a married clergyman \$1,500 and a suitable place to live, or \$1,500 in money...

Dr. Parks said there were twenty-one clergymen in charge of missions in New York whose stipends ranged from \$400 a year to \$1,000, while one clergyman was getting no salary at all. To carry yesterday's resolution into effect, Dr. Parks said it would be necessary to levy a tax...

"I put this resolution on the basis of pure equity," he continued, "but it calls not on the strong, broad shouldered men, but on the wives and children of the ministry..."

Bishop Greer, who followed Dr. Parks, said: "I wish to say that the resolution has my hearty approval. I think nothing has come or can come out of this convention which can be more important to the diocese than this resolution..."

Toward the end of the afternoon session Dr. Manning, rector of Trinity Church, obtained the passage of a supplementary resolution which would increase the salary of the rector to \$1,500 a year...

The committee on canon law recommended that the expenses of the diocese be paid in the future against the entire current funds of churches instead of, as at present, against the amount of parish clergyman's salaries...

The amendment was adopted by a large majority. The recommendations of the sub-committee of the Social Service Commission which reported that the Social Service Commission on Wednesday, came up again for discussion...

The committee on canon law recommended that no church or parish be admitted to union with the diocese until it was able to pay its running expenses...

POLICE HERO TABLETS.

Municipal Art Society to Put Two on New Headquarters.

William Laurel Harris, chairman of the committee on permanent work of the Municipal Art Society, announced yesterday that the gift from the society to the city this year would take the form of two tablets, to be placed on either side of the main entrance of the new headquarters of the Police Department, in Centre street...

These tablets are to commemorate the heroes of the Police Department who have lost their lives in the performance of duty. They will be of bronze, of the Georgian period, in keeping with the character of the building, bearing the city coat-of-arms, and with a marble field on which the names inscribed in bronze letters may be applied...

Mr. Harris said the artistic character of the work was assured by the selection of T. L. V. Hoppin, of Hoppin & Koen, architects, who had generously given his professional services...

The Municipal Art Society expects to be able eventually to make gifts to all the other city departments. The officers-elect of the society are: John G. Aear, president; William T. Evans, first vice-president; John J. Boyle, second vice-president; Frederick S. Lamb, secretary; Robert E. Rucker, treasurer, and Nelson S. Spencer, counsel.

"MET" BONDHOLDERS GET TOGETHER. The bondholders' committee, representing respectively the general and collateral 5 per cent bonds and the refunding 4 per cent bonds of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, has authorized a joint committee of four to take the necessary steps to formulate a plan for the readjustment and reorganization of the securities and properties of the Metropolitan Street Railway system...

The committee consists of Donald Mackay and William P. Dixon, chosen by the bondholders' committee representing the general and collateral 5, and John W. Castles and Otto N. Kahn, chosen by the bondholders' committee representing the refunding 4 per cent bonds of the Metropolitan Street Railway system...

The joint committee has been organized as follows: Chairman, John W. Castles; secretary, Alexander J. Hemphill; counsel, L. C. Krauthoff.
