

FOR FREIGHT SUBWAY SCHEME OF C. N. FOWLER. Congressman Proposes to Take City's Heavy Traffic from Streets.

Congressman Charles N. Fowler, representing the New York Parcel Dispatch Company, explained in detail yesterday at a hearing of the Public Service Commission the plan for freight subways which his company would like to establish in this city.

Congressman Fowler's plan provides for small cars to carry from one to five tons of freight, which could be moved anywhere outside of the subway with the power of two men.

Congressman Fowler said his plan provided for the construction of a subway below the public service pipes, such as sewers and water mains, which could be done without the disturbance of the surface of the streets.

Several persons spoke generally in favor of a freight subway, but George O. Lord, who said he had been secretary of the Maritime Exchange, opposed the idea.

An adjournment was taken until December 4, at 2 p. m., as W. J. Wilgus said a number of commercial organizations examining his plan would not be able to report before that time.

BECEIVERS WANT NEW TRACKS. Ask for Permission to Spend \$200,000 in 4th and Madison Avenues.

Arthur H. Masten, counsel for the receivers of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, applied yesterday to Justice McCall in the United States Circuit Court for permission to spend \$200,000 of the money he has been authorized to raise on receivers' certificates in laying new tracks for the Fourth avenue and Madison avenue line.

It was stated in the application that this line was really the backbone of the Metropolitan system, its gross earnings last year being \$1,200,000, or 12 per cent of the money earned by the entire system in the same period.
