


BUSY AT PALACE SHOW MANY SALES MADE TO BIG DEALERS.

MONTREAL TEAM LOSES AMERICAN SEVEN WINS.

Italian Forced to Leave Track After Running Nineteen Miles.

Buffalo, Jan. 2.—Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian runner, repeated his victory over Dorando Pietri, the Italian, in a Marathon run here to-night. As was the case in New York on their former meeting, Dorando collapsed and Longboat won by himself.

The end came with startling suddenness in the sixth lap of the nineteenth mile. Dorando had just made one of his spectacular sprints, and the ten thousand persons in the army were on their feet, cheering lustily, when the Italian faltered and fell to the track.

Francis Nelson, of Toronto, acted as referee, and William Tomlinson, chairman of the State Democratic Committee, fired the starting signal.
