Golfers After "Near Amateurs"

Western Association Adopts Drastic Rule to Govern Eligibility of Players.

The Western Golf Association has thrown down the gauntlet to the "near amateur" in no uncertain manner, and it is possible that the United States Golf Association may see the wisdom of legislating along similar lines.

Section 7—No person shall be considered an amateur golfer or shall be eligible to compete in the amateur championship of this association, or in any event authorized or held by it, who accepts or teaches the game of golf, or who personally makes or repairs golf clubs, golf balls or other golf articles for pay, or who, after the age of sixteen years, has received pay for services as a caddy, caddie master or green keeper, or who is or has been a professional in any other branch of athletics.

Section 8—All competitions held under the jurisdiction of this association shall be played strictly in accordance with the rules of the game of golf as approved by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, St. Andrews, Scotland, and such special and other rules as this association may adopt.

Section 9—The association shall have the right to suspend any member of the association who is found to be in violation of any of the rules of the game of golf, or who is found to be in violation of any of the special and other rules of the association.

AUTO RACING CONTROL.

Manufacturers Discuss Formation of a Governing Body.

Seven foreign and nearly a dozen American manufacturers were represented at a meeting held at the Hotel Victoria yesterday, called for the purpose of forming, or taking steps to form, a body for the control of automobile racing in America.

Had there been a longer interval between the decision to effect an organization and the meeting a larger number of manufacturers would undoubtedly have been represented.

STATE CAN'T SUPPORT 200,000 REFUGEES MUCH LONGER—DISORDER AMONG LOWER CLASSES.

Rome, Jan. 21.—The gravest problem which Italy now faces is that of providing for the two hundred thousand refugees made homeless by the earthquake. Most of them are now in Naples, their support is costing approximately \$100,000 a day, an expense which neither charity nor the resources of the state can bear for long.

SPANISH ORDER FOR QUEEN HELENA.

Madrid, Jan. 21.—King Alfonso to-day signed a decree conferring on Queen Helena of Italy the Grand Cross of the Order of Beneficence for her labors in the interests of the survivors of the Italian earthquake.

SHIP WHICH AIDED SUFFERERS ARRIVES.

Additional details of the Messina earthquake were told by Captain Zinini of the steamer Sicania, which arrived yesterday. The captain said that on December 30 he took his vessel to Messina from Palermo, having on board two hundred soldiers, to assist the captain hunted by William Pierce, one of the owners of the Sicania, and found that both he and his daughter had escaped. George Pierce, he and his brother, however, together with his entire family, consisting of his wife and five children, perished.
