King James Wins Rich Prize

Beats Dorante a Short Head in Burns Handicap on the Coast.

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 30.—S. C. Hildreth's King James, the four-year-old son of Plianti—Unslightly, took up weight of 124 pounds and won the rich Burns Handicap at one mile and a quarter here to-day.

Colonel Jack was scratched at the last moment, and the Williams pair, Firestone and Big Chief, the Williams entry, Arasee, Don Enrique, Amnium, Clamor, Light Wool, Matthe and Nodan.

The Burns Handicap, which is the richest and most coveted stake decided in California, had a gross value of \$13,740, of which \$10,500 went to the winner.
