DECISION IN EVANS WILL.

Application to Pay Into Court a Sum of \$75,000 Is Set Aside.

The application of W. J. Lane, counsel for the executors of the will of Dr. Thomas W. Evans, the American dentist who made a fortune in France and died in Paris, leaving an estate valued at about \$200,000, to pay into court a sum of about \$75,000, representing the amount said to be due to J. Roland Evans and Juliette C. Henderson, legatees under Dr. Evans's will, pending an application as to claims against these sums by creditors, was denied by Justice Erlanger, in the Supreme Court, yesterday.

Both legatees are dead, and assignments of large sums are held by creditors of their estates, while claims for debts for various articles and goods supplied are made in the case of the estate of Juliette C. Henderson.

Dr. Evans left most of his property to form the Evans Institute, in Philadelphia, and after considerable litigation a settlement was made with the heirs of Dr. Evans, who contested his will, by which they received \$300,000 in all.
