

NEW COURSES PLANNED

YACHT RACES LONGER.

Cruising Handicap Contests for New York Yacht Club.

According to an announcement made yesterday by the regatta committee of the New York Yacht Club, the most radical departure in the matter of racing ever attempted by the club is about to be tried during the coming season, apparently with the consent of a majority of the yacht owners.

Speaking of the tentative schedule announced, a member of the club, who is a racing man, said last night: "This step has not been taken hastily. It is the result of much serious consideration on the part of yacht owners, who believe that such races as proposed will bring out a larger and more varied class of yachts. They will have plenty of open water on the long race to Newport, and it will give them a splendid opportunity to test the new handicap rule, which was adopted last year, but which has not been tried in the annual regatta of the Larchmont Yacht Club, on July 4."

PRINCETON BEATS HARVARD IN TANK.


Tiger Swimmers Win Dual Meet and Take Water Polo Game from Crimson.
