H. H. ROGERS BURIED

His Body Placed in the Family Tomb at Fairhaven.

Fairhaven, Mass., May 22.—In a massive Greek mausoleum on a knoll overlooking the town of his birth, the body of Henry Huttleston Rogers rests to-night.

As a tribute of respect and of affection for its most distinguished son, Fairhaven observed to-day as a day of mourning. Business was suspended throughout the town, public buildings were draped in mourning and flags were displayed at half-staff. Silent lines of children from the schools built by Mr. Rogers's generosity filed by the coffin, and a procession of sorrowing residents of the town took a last look at the face of their friend and former fellow citizen, as the body lay in state in the imposing Unitarian Memorial Church erected by the financier as a memorial to his deceased mother.

The funeral, which was the simplest in character, was most impressive. There were huge banks of flowers in front of the altar, where the coffin was placed, and a great mound of blooms in Mr. Rogers's pew. Throughout the period that the body was in the church it was attended by a guard of Free Masons, representing George H. Taber Lodge, of this town, to which Mr. Rogers had presented a fine Masonic Hall, and Star of the East Lodge, of New Bedford, of which he had been an active member for more than forty years.

The services were held at 2:30 p. m., admission being limited to ticket holders. So great, however, was the number of Mr. Rogers's personal friends that the capacity of the edifice was taxed. The services consisted of music by organ and choir, reading of the Scriptures, a tribute to Mr. Rogers's memory by the Rev. Frank L. Phalen, pastor of the church; a eulogy by the Rev. Dr. Robert Collyer, the venerable pastor emeritus of the Church of the Messiah, New York; a prayer by the Rev. Dr. Samuel A. Eliot, president of the American Unitarian Association, and a benediction by the Rev. Mr. Phalen.

The burial took place at Riverside Cemetery, in which the Rogers mausoleum is located. The services at the tomb were of the simplest character, consisting of prayer, committal service, and a final word of farewell by Dr. Collyer.

In his address at the church Dr. Collyer said: "Since the first time we met, thirty years ago, not the slightest cross has ever touched my regard for him or his regard for me. His manly love grew constantly riper, sweeter and stronger as the years went on. He was generous and open-hearted toward all poor folks and to all who were trying to walk in faith, hope and love. He was pure in heart, pure in speech, pure wherever you might find him. I never heard him using a harsh word, a vile word. When he made a promise he was as true as steel, a man immovable in purpose. The only consolation I have is that I am going toward the setting sun to find my dear friend, my dear companion."

Norfolk, Va., May 22.—At 2:30 o'clock this afternoon all trains on the Virginian Railway and all other operations of that system came to a stop for five minutes, as a tribute of respect to the memory of the late Henry H. Rogers, whose funeral occurred at that hour in Fairhaven, Mass.

Butte, Mont., May 22.—During the funeral ceremonies of the late Henry H. Rogers, at Fairhaven, Mass., to-day all work stopped on the properties of the Amalgamated Copper Company in Montana.

Boston, May 22.—In a letter published in "The Boston Transcript" to-day Helen Keller, the deaf, dumb and blind young woman, pays a personal tribute to the memory of Henry H. Rogers, who had taken a great interest in her education. Miss Keller writes:

"In the death of Mr. H. H. Rogers I have lost a dear friend. The protest of my heart against the thought of losing him makes me realize how much I loved him. No, he is not dead. This is the wonderful message which the blossoming world outside my study window is bringing me as I write. He has simply gone beyond the dull arms of matter to a higher, holier life, and in a little while I shall find him again and feel the tender clasp of his hand.

"I shall not try now to express my gratitude, for I think that Mr. Rogers shrank from expressions of gratitude. Mr. Rogers was always responsive, always sympathetic. He was always doing little kindnesses quietly and unobtrusively. If I needed books he ordered them. If I admired a flower or a plant he sent it to me.

"He had the imagination, the vision and the heart of a great man, and I count it one of the most precious privileges of my life to have had him for my friend. The memory of his friendship will grow sweeter and brighter each year until he takes my hand again and we gather roses together in the gardens of Paradise."

BADLY INJURED BY FLYING HAMMER.

Professor Hoak, of Purdue University, Victim of Wild Throw in Schoolboy Games.

Lafayette, Ind., May 22.—Professor B. M. Hoak, of Purdue University, was badly injured in the track and field games of the state high schools here to-day. He was acting as one of the judges in the hammer throw, when a missile, hurled wildly by Conwell, of Van Buren, struck him in the abdomen. He was knocked down and is said to be in a serious condition.

Two or three days ago word came from New Haven that Yale and Harvard would join forces against the hammer throw in an effort to have it withdrawn from the intercollegiate meet because of the danger to onlookers.

TRAIN SERVICE IMPROVED.

During March 92 Per Cent of Passenger Traffic Was on Time.

Albany, May 22.—During the month of March 92-100 passenger trains were operated on the steam railroads of the state, of which 92 per cent were on time, according to a statement issued to-day by the Public Service Commission.

This is the highest percentage attained since the commission undertook the investigation into the causes of passenger train delays a year ago. The highest previous record was for February, when a mark of 88 per cent was attained.

GREAT WESTERN BONDS NOT ISSUED.

A report yesterday that \$15,000,000 of the \$50,000,000 first mortgage bonds of the Chicago Great Western Railway Company to be issued under the reorganization plan had been underwritten by a syndicate headed by J. P. Morgan & Co., was denied on high authority. No arrangements, it was added, had yet been made with any bankers for the placing of bonds, and the issue which would be \$15,000,000 instead of \$15,000,000. It is expected that the reorganization plan will be ready for public announcement within a fortnight or so.
