SUES FOR \$76,000,000. Ex-Judge Dewey Says He Was Ibbelled in Boston Campaign.

Boston, June 2.—Dealing with a wide range of subjects, from the burning of witches in Salem to city politics in 1905, former Judge Henry S. Dewey opened his case in the Superior Court to-day in his own behalf, in an effort to obtain damages to the amount of \$76,000,000 from officials of the Good Government Association, who, he claimed, libeled him in the majority campaign four years ago.

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PLANS 5TH AVE. SUBWAY WOULD OPEN STEINWAY TUNNEL IMMEDIATELY.

MURDER IN TARRYTOWN. Woman Says She Saw Body Near Rockefeller Estate.

The entrance to the "duck farm" on John D. Rockefeller's estate, in the Sleepy Hollow section, was the scene of a murder on Sunday night, according to the story of Mrs. A. Tophit. She delivers milk in Tarrytown, and says that as she was driving past the Rockefeller estate about 5 o'clock on Monday morning she saw a man lying face upturned in the road, covered with blood.

TRIAL OF NEW GUN. Throats 250 Three-Pound Shells a Minute at Cleveland.

Cleveland, June 2.—The first test of the McClean-Lissak automatic gun, said to be the largest automatic gun in the world, mounted on an auto truck, was made here to-day. Three-pound shells were thrown three and one-half miles out into Lake Erie at the rate of 250 a minute.

WON "IN THE STRETCH." Midshipman Who Went on the Rack Will Be Graduated Fourth.

Annapolis, Md., June 2.—Luther Welsh, of Kansas City, who had to stretch himself four years ago to get into the Naval Academy, will graduate on Friday as No. 4 among the 174 picked men of his class, and with equally as good a record in athletics and as a drill commander.

ROBBED D. G. REID'S PRIVATE CAR. Minister's Young Son Says Negro Aided Him and Then Took Booty.

Charles S. Sparman, the fourteen-year-old son of a Methodist minister of Dillon, S. C., was arrested in the Pennsylvania freight yards at Jersey City yesterday, charged with breaking into the private car of Daniel G. Reid, president of the board of directors of the Rock Island Railroad, and stealing about \$500 worth of silverware, four Winchester rifles, a shotgun, a Colt's revolver, a meat cleaver and some clothing.

STEEL COMPANIES "SWAP." Corporation and Republic Exchange Ground and Peace Reigns.

UNION MEN COME TO NO AGREEMENT WITH ROAD AT BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

Baltimore, June 2.—No agreement was reached at a conference to-day between Vice-President Potter, of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, and officers of the machinists, blacksmiths and boiler-makers' organizations. The chief issue is the extension of the piecework system in the shops of the company.

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Rochester, June 2.—Two children of Mr. and Mrs. James Lynch, of the Byron Hotel, Byron, Genesee County, got into a gasoline house in the rear of a hardware store in the village to-day; turned the faucets of the gasoline tank and set the oil afire. Gladys Lynch, three years old, was unable to escape from the house and was burned to death.

TWO HUNDRED HURT IN STRIKE RIOTS PHILADELPHIA POLICE ALMOST POWERLESS.

Philadelphia, June 2.—Furious mobs, incensed by the appearance of strike breakers from New York and other cities, who came here to-day to man cars of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company, broke all bounds to-night and attacked the few cars running, dragging crews from platforms and defying the police. Two hundred persons were injured.

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
