VACATIONS FOR GIRLS

A Society Which Helps Them to Find Cheap Board in the Country.

It seems late in the summer to talk about vacations, but there are a good many girls in office, shops and factories who have not been able to take theirs yet. The Committee on Amusements and Vacation Resources of Working Girls thinks that some of these young women would be glad to know of the circular it has issued giving a list of reputable places in the country and at the seashore where comfortable board can be had for \$2.50 or \$3 a week.

"Every place on our list," said Mrs. Charles H. Israel, chairman of the committee, "has been investigated personally by Miss Schoenfeld. If she decided of a place that we will send you a circular to stay there herself it didn't go on our list. It was our idea that there were people in the country who had pleasant homes, with gardens, cows and chickens, but who felt that they weren't quite up to the standard of city boarders, yet feared that if they gave board at very low rates they would attract an undesirable class. We guarantee these people that we will send you a circular to stay there ourselves if you wish to stay there."

"How did we find the places? We advertised for them. More than two-thirds Miss Schoenfeld threw out upon investigation. Some were near liquor saloons or in otherwise undesirable neighborhoods; some were not clean; some had no material goods; some were in places where the women could not count on swimming and bathing. If it is near the shore, or on farm joys, if it is inland, our circular describes every place, tells the distance from New York, how to reach there, and the amount of the fare."

GLEANINGS.

An old fashion that deserves the revival it seems to be having is the use of lavender. "Lavender, sweet lavender," used to be cried about the streets in English towns, and is beginning to be sold again, both in London and New York.

Laid away between the folds of clothing, lavender, it is said, will keep out the moths, and how much better! Some women make quaint little bags to put the dried lavender leaves in. The bags may be embroidered in cross-stitch, in designs showing baskets filled with bright flowers, wreaths inclosing a name, a monogram or a motto, or a spray of violets. A bag that is easy to make is an embroidered handkerchief folded and bound with lavender wigs ribbons and finished with sewing silk.

A delightful towel water is made of white wine vinegar and lavender flowers. Steep the lavender, handfuls of it, in the vinegar, using stone jars. Keep the jars for three days in a moderately warm place on the stove, after which strain and bottle it.
