GENERAL CORBIN BURIED.

Full Military Honors Paid to His Memory.

Washington, Sept. 10.—With military honors befitting his rank as lieutenant general, the funeral of Henry C. Corbin, who died in New York on Wednesday, was held here today.

Among those at the church were ex-Senator and Mrs. Foraker, Thomas F. Walsh, army and naval officers stationed in Washington, and well known civilians.

The coffin, draped with a flag and covered with flowers, was placed on a caisson at the entrance of the church, while the military escort stood at attention and the engine band played "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

NAVIGATION RULES.

Government Regulations for Hudson-Fulton River Fete.

Washington, Sept. 10.—Additional anchorage accommodations for American and foreign war vessels in the Hudson River during the Hudson-Fulton celebration from September 21 to October 15, inclusive, and other arrangements to govern navigation during parades and races at that time were announced in regulations issued today by Mr. McHarg, Acting Secretary of Commerce and Labor.

An anchorage is set aside for naval vessels to moor on the east side of the Hudson River. Its southernmost limit shall be opposite 44th street and its northernmost limit shall be opposite 100th street.
