


REPLICA OF HUDSON'S HALF MOON.



size of the craft, one of them being only 63 feet long, it will probably not be possible to permit visitors to go through them.

In the evening, starting at 7 o'clock, the naval parade of the afternoon will be repeated, the war vessels being illuminated and a battery of powerful searchlights at and above Grant's Tomb by ingenious devices will arch the river with a flood of light. The searchlight battery will make the river as light as day for miles in each direction, it is announced. When brought together in one beam on the night of October 9 the resulting ray will be seen a distance of fifty miles under favorable conditions. There will be a group of searchlights playing on Grant's Tomb, at 116th street and Riverside Drive, and on the evening of September 25 there will be an elaborate display of fireworks.


On Wednesday and Thursday, September 29 and 30, there will be aquatic sports opposite Riverside Park. Those of Wednesday will consist of pulling races between the crews of foreign and American warships, interstate contests between Naval Reserve crews and intership pulling races between crews from various vessels of the United States Revenue Service. At Yonkers there will be motor boat races for boats 32 feet and under. On the following day there will be five motor boat races at New York. On Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock the Cler-

that the New England and Atlantic coasts as far south as Norfolk are being drawn upon for steamers to supply the demand.

Spectators gathered along the north shore of Staten Island and the Bay Ridge shore of Brooklyn and at the Battery will have an opportunity to witness all of the parade except the line of war vessels, which is to remain at anchor in the North River. On Saturday morning at 10:20 o'clock the replicas of the Half Moon and the Clermont, escorted by a squadron of torpedo boats, submarines, naval militia boats and other craft, will leave the Kill van Kull and proceed to Stapleton, where the squadron will be joined by Captain Jacob W. Miller, the commanding officer of the parade. At 11 a. m., after an exchange of civilities between the fleet and the Richmond Borough Citizens' Committee, the two replicas and the escorting squadron will cross over to the Bay Ridge shore, where a similar exchange of courtesies will take place between the escort fleet and the Brooklyn Citizens' Committee. This will be visible from the Shore Drive, where the Brooklyn Park Department intends to place seats for the accommodation of fifteen thousand persons and erect four bandstands separated by intervals of half a mile. Continuous music is to be provided.

From Bay Ridge the replicas and their escort will proceed to a point off Governor's Island and start up the river at 1 p. m. In the meantime the great merchant fleet will be assembling in the Lower Bay and will start up the river in the wake of the Clermont and the Half Moon at 1:15 p. m., the point of departure being midstream between St. George, Staten Island, and Bay Ridge. When the head of the column reaches the southernmost warship, off 42d street, it will swing off to the New Jersey side of the line of war vessels, while the Clermont and the Half Moon, with their escort, will proceed up the Manhattan side of the river to the official reviewing stand at 110th street. It is intended that they shall arrive here about 3:15 p. m. and be officially received with appropriate ceremonies. The remainder of the parade will pass around the north end of the line of war vessels, and, returning, pass the replicas in review at 110th street.

From this time until Wednesday morning, September 29, the Half Moon and the Clermont will remain anchored off 110th street, in the North River, where it will be possible for the public to look at the vessels. Owing to the small

mont and the Half Moon, accompanied by an honorary escort squadron, will proceed to Yonkers.

The third great naval affair of the celebration will be the parade up the Hudson to Newburg of torpedo boats, submarines, a cruiser, the Castine, steamboats, ferryboats, steam yachts, motor boats, tugs, sailing craft, revenue cutters, fast steamers, federal, state and municipal craft, motor boats, ambulance boats, etc. This parade will assemble on the Hudson River between Fort Lee and Spuyten Duyvil, the slower boats getting away at 7:30 a. m. and the faster
