

FLORIDA TRAIN CAUGHT
BLOCKED BY LANDSLIDES.
Little to Eat—Two Tugs Lost—
Dead Number Twelve.

Miami, Fla., Oct. 13.—Late reports from Jewish Creek, on the Florida East Coast Railroad extension, state that a passenger train is held between Jewish and Quarry, with four passengers aboard. Washouts holds the train blocked on both sides. Four thousand feet of the track has been shifted fifty feet from the roadbed between Manatee and Jewish. The provisions at the Jewish extension camp are low. There have been no fatalities there.

W. Carter, on the railroad company's launch 12 noon, reports the loss of the tug Sybil, Captain Parker and eleven of the crew, at Bahia Honda. J. H. Brown was drowned at the Marathon extension headquarters. There was no loss of life at Spanish Harbor, West Sumnerland, Pison or Bott Key. The tug Sadie was wrecked at Bahia Honda. The crew escaped.

The loss of life on the tug Sybil includes, besides Captain Parker, two engineers, named Fox and Peterson; Whitmore, the pilot, and seven deckhands. The following statement was given out today by Ernest Cotton, engineer of the Florida East Coast Railway.

The loss of life on the Florida East Coast extension is limited to the crew of the tug Sybil and twelve persons. The floating equipment of the road and uncompleted work were badly damaged. There was, however, no damage to the men or work at any point. All of our men were more or less cared for and have sufficient supplies of food. The men behaved well, and already every gang has gone to work clearing away the wreckage and preparing for reopening the extension to traffic.

It was announced today that the steamer's Key will begin sailings to-morrow from Miami, continuing this service until the extension is again opened to traffic.

Key West, Fla., Oct. 13.—Hundreds of laborers are clearing the streets and the waterfront of the debris resulting from the hurricane which practically destroyed half of the city on Monday. It will be many days before normal business conditions may be resumed here.

Great rejoicing is felt over the reports from points near Key West showing that the loss of life from the "big blow" has been the smallest ever recorded along the Florida coast. The property damage, however, is the heaviest in the history of the peninsula.

Acting on a resolution of the City Council, last night, Mayor Fogarty issued an appeal for help from the people of the United States, saying: "Scarcely a house in this city of twenty thousand persons but has been either entirely demolished or partially damaged. Many are homeless and those who have homes are hardly in a position to help the other sufferers.

"Starvation and distress face our people, who have always themselves responded generously to the call of other cities afflicted as we are now. Cash contributions for the poor will be gladly received by the Mayor and applied by him to the aid of those who sorely need it."

OPENS BIG LABOR SUIT.
Loewe Attorney Outlines Case
Against Danbury Hatters' Union.

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 13.—Daniel Davenport, counsel for the plaintiffs in the labor union suit of D. E. Loewe and others against the Hatters' Union of Danbury, in which damages of \$200,000 are asked because of an alleged boycott, occupied two hours this afternoon in outlining his side of the case to the jury. In the course of his remarks he characterized the American Federation of Labor as "a great crusading, propagandizing propaganda."

Mr. Davenport traced the evolution of the labor union from small local centers to bodies, and then to the great central organization, the Federation of Labor, and explained how the United Hatters' Union of North America was affiliated with that body. He explained the nature of the Sherman anti-trust law, enacted in 1890, and its relation to interstate commerce, saying that any one who suffered damage to his business in violation of the law governing traffic in goods between states could sue the person who had injured his business, no matter where, with the proviso that the defendants must be brought to trial in the district in which they live.

He said the laws made by the Loewe firm were sold in stores other than Connecticut. He told of the losses of the firm by reason of the alleged boycott. At the time of the outbreak of the trouble, he said, its business amounted to \$400,000 a year; after the trouble began it dropped to \$200,000 a year.

It is understood that when the case is resumed to-morrow D. E. Loewe will be called as the first witness for the plaintiff.

PIEMEN GAIN RECRUIT.
Slugs Nose Out His Friends and
Joins the Union.

Slugs has joined the ranks of the striking pie bakers, and last night was a member of the union in good standing, better than any other striker, because Slugs stands on four feet. He is a shaggy dog of nondescript color and white spots, and before the strike occurred he guarded one of the bakeries now turning out non-union dypses.

Slugs was on good terms with the old employees before the strike. Indeed, it is told of him that he struck his union sympathies that he tried to bring a new man who offered him a piece of non-union pie. When the men walked out Slugs felt that his friends had deserted him. He waited for them morning and evening, and when they did not return put his nose to the ground until he struck the scent, and followed it up until it brought him to No. 142 7th street, the headquarters of the strikers.

There a meeting was just about to start, and Slugs frisked about and showed such extravagant signs of pleasure and sympathy with the strike that he was allowed to attend the meeting. He barked his approval when speakers told the strikers to stand firm and wait for the sympathy of the pie eating public. The strike leaders professed to have received secret information that the old bakers were going to put one hundred strike players were going to work to-day. Representatives of the Bakers' Employers' Association would only say, however, that the situation was unchanged and that no pies were being baked.

FUGITIVE ITALIAN BANKER HELD.
Giovanni Savarese Surrenders Himself—Counsel Says He Will Settle Claims.

Giovanni Savarese, an Italian banker at No. 223 Ninth avenue, who lives at No. 228 Ninth avenue, and who admits that he has been in hiding on a Sullivan County farm since June 14, when he fled to avoid financial entanglements, was arraigned yesterday in the Tombs police court. He had surrendered himself to a detective at Columbus Circle. He was held in \$1,000 bail for examination on Friday afternoon on the charge that he withheld \$46 belonging to one Frank Lavalle, of No. 353 West 41st street.
