COURT INDIGNANT
Justice McCall Denounces Mortgage Tangle.
WANT KNOX TO HELP
Women May Go to Washington in Miss Paul's Behalf.

Justice McCall handed down a memorandum yesterday on one of some twenty-five motions that have come before several judges of the Supreme Court in the much involved litigation on the foreclosure of a second mortgage on the property Nos. 337 and 339 West 11th street and Nos. 719 and 721 Washington street.
The Builders' Construction Company, which was incorporated by Charles H. Stoddard, a lawyer, at No. 141 Broadway, held a six-story loft building on the site three years ago. The property was bought, it is said, with an inconsiderable outlay of money and the purchasers have incurred it with so many mortgages that the judgment creditors have been unable to collect any money.

Dr. Shaw Not to Represent Suffragettes at Hippodrome.
In order that the National Woman Suffrage Association may not be open to the charge of taking sides on labor questions, the president, the Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, who is to address the big meeting of shirtwaist strikers in the Hippodrome on Sunday, said yesterday that she was going to do so as an individual and not officially.
"The object of the National Woman Suffrage Association is to secure the ballot for women," she stated, "and not to cooperate with associations organized for different purposes. At the same time it does not detract to individuals, and I gladly accepted the invitation to speak at this meeting because it gives me an opportunity to get a hearing for suffrage before a new group of people, and because I believe in labor unions for women. I am tremendously interested in these strikes, and I think it is time for women to stand together and boost each other, instead of boosting men all the time."

HOUSEHOLD TALKS.
If one wishes to test the purity of powdered coffee the following method is recommended: To a tumbler of cold water add some of the powdered coffee. Most adulterants will settle at the bottom, leaving trails of brownish color behind them as they sink, but genuine coffee will float without giving a distinctive color to the water for several minutes.
Oranges may be served cut in two, flavored with sherry and sweetened with powdered sugar.
