MEN "HIGHER UP" ARREST OF A PRINCE Many Other Spanish Officers Sent to the Provinces. Madrid, Jan. 14—Prince Pignatelli, alleged to have been involved in the recently discovered plot through which the Conservatives are said to have aimed to enfold the army with the government, was arrested to-day.

Motorists Turn Out in Force, with Show Only One Day to Run. The turbulent weather caused no cessation of interest in the automobile show at Madison Square Garden yesterday.

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Believing that the interests of those who buy motor cars should be protected against dealers who are selling cars which infringe the Selden patent, a call has been issued with a view to forming an organization to be known as the Licensed Automobile Dealers of New York.

Since the decision sustaining the Selden patent as covering the modern gasoline automobile many dealers believe that purchasers should be informed fully as to the importance of buying only those cars that are licensed.

The articles in the "Correspondencia Militar," which revealed the plot of the Conservatives to enfold the army with the government, were written by Señor Llorens, a Carlist Deputy and officer, who used a pseudonym. The issue of the paper was suppressed, whereupon the demonstration of army officers was made in front of the newspaper office.

The police raided the office, and upon the evidence secured, the Cabinet was hurriedly assembled under the Presidency of King Alfonso, who sanctioned the removal of Count de Villard as Captain General of Madrid and the arrest of Llorens, implicated. That the affair had widespread ramifications was indicated by the subsequent removal last night of the Captains General of Valencia, Valladolid and Coruna.

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There are also grave rumors of a Carlist uprising, and it is understood that Don Jaime de Bourbon, the Spanish Pretender, is preparing to issue a manifesto describing the ruin of "fallen Spain" since the overthrow of his great grandfather, attacking the free thinkers, Protestants and other enemies of social order, and appealing for a revival of Catholic unity as the but to what extent is not known.

GENERAL RAILROAD SITUATION. Chicago, Jan. 14.—The general railroad situation indicates a lessened demand for cars, according to the fortnightly bulletin of the American Railway Association. The grand totals show a decrease in the surplus of 6,045. The Canadian group is the only one that shows a decrease in the surplus. The most notable change is in the North Atlantic group, where a surplus of 1,862 and a shortage of 838 in the last bulletin are charged to a surplus of 1,731 and shortage of 1,475. This is due apparently to a general slackening of business on the tidewater coal roads.
