

GARDNER TAKES FORM SHOWS RARE SKILL ON INDOOR COURTS.

Many Stirring Matches Mark Play for Lawn Tennis Championship.

Two California players stood out in the singles and doubles of the national indoor tennis championship tournament yesterday.

Paired with Touchard, who in his one singles match defeated William B. Cragin, Jr. at 4-2, 5-7, Gardner disposed of the doubles champion, Wythe C. Grant, paired with Dr. William Rosenbaum, at 6-3, 6-4, and then put out O. V. Bostwick and William C. De Mille, 6-2, 5-7, 6-4.

Altogether the third day of the competition provided a record. In all thirty-two matches were decided, despite the fact that the gloomy weather was intensified indoors.

The light was better at the time of play than it had been for some days. The play was fast and spectacular. Interest centered upon the pairing of Gardner and Touchard, continuing their rivalry, won the first set, 6-2, and led at 3-1 on the second.

It was at this point that Touchard "blew up." The strain of the matches appeared to have been much for him, and he turned to his partner's court. Under a fusillade of shots Touchard was helpless, and Bostwick and De Mille won six games in order and the set.

Coming to the rescue of Touchard in the second set, Gardner afforded him opportunities for rest by consistent lobbing, and so slackened the pace as to give Touchard time to steady himself. Gardner likewise took advantage of every opening for a driving pass, maintaining the lead at 4-3 and 5-2.
