PINCHOT FINISHES TESTIMONY.

Explains Writing of Dolliver Letter—More "Inferences" Against Ballinger.

Washington, March 5.—Gifford Pinchot, former chief of the Forest Service, finished his testimony before the Ballinger-Pinchot committee late this afternoon, and was succeeded on the stand by James R. Garfield, ex-Secretary of the Interior.

Mr. Fletcher intimated that the withdrawal from entry for national forests of an area of land greater than the New England States, one-third of this land not being in fact forest land, might involve the government's going into business on an extensive scale to develop waterpower, to cut and sell timber, to graze cattle, etc.

Mr. Fletcher intimated that the withdrawal from entry for national forests of an area of land greater than the New England States, one-third of this land not being in fact forest land, might involve the government's going into business on an extensive scale to develop waterpower, to cut and sell timber, to graze cattle, etc.
