JURY FAVORS POLICE CAPTAIN.

Hodgins, Formerly of 10th Precinct, Wins Suit for Reinstatement.

William H. Hodgins, formerly captain of the 10th police precinct, won a victory in the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, yesterday, when a jury brought in a verdict in his favor in his suit for reinstatement.

MESSANGER GUILTY OF LARCENY

Verdict Against Prisoner Who Told Employers He Had Lost Money.

Joseph Harris, a messenger, who said he had lost \$125 in cash and \$75 in checks which he should have deposited in a bank on January 20 for his employers, the Sultz, was convicted of grand larceny in the first degree yesterday in the Court of General Sessions, with a recommendation for mercy.

ANOTHER MILK MAN PLEADS.

Water R. Comfort, one of the eight indicted directors of the Consolidated Milk Exchange, surrendered himself yesterday and pleaded not guilty before Justice Thayer in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court. Comfort was in custody a week ago when the seven other indicted directors pleaded. He gave bail in \$1,000.

POLICE ON STRIKE.

Six of Rutherford Force Object to "Special Officer."

Passaic, N. J., March 19.—Six of Rutherford's police force of nine men are on strike and the borough is practically without police protection to-day. When the patrolmen reported for duty new rules and regulations, ordered by the police committee and Mayor David Bosman, were read to them. There was a loud protest on the part of the officers and they struck. Mayor Bosman then suspended them.

NO CARS IN TRENTON.

Company, Stopping Service at Dark, Ask More Police.

Trenton, N. J., March 19.—There is no trolley car running in Trenton to-night. The Trenton Street Railway Company at 4 o'clock took off the few cars that were then in operation. General Manager Hurley of the company notified Mayor Madden of his intention to stop running the cars, and gave as a reason the fear that the cars would be attacked after nightfall.

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W. B. CUTTING SUEED IN ARMY AND NAVY

Former Partner's Wife Charges Fraud in Ferry Deal.

Charges of fraud and misrepresentation are made by Mrs. Jennie M. Stephens in her suit against William Bayard Cutting over transactions in the copartnership with William A. Stephens, the late husband of the plaintiff and the defendant, of which Mrs. Stephens demands an accounting. She seeks also to set aside an agreement to which she entered with Cutting on December 5, 1903. By this she accepted under a misapprehension of the purport of the document \$100,000, which she thought was a loan on her interest in the copartnership.

POLICE GET SCARE.

Bank Window Smashed to Aid Stricken Watchman.

A dense crowd gathered at the East Side branch of the Exchange Bank last night when Christopher Iverson, janitor of the building next door, smashed in the window of the big plate glass windows with a nightstick. Timothy Sweeney, night watchman of the bank, had fallen in a paralytic stroke, and Iverson, hearing his groans, looked through the window and saw him lying on the floor of the manager's office. Sure that some one had broken into the bank and assaulted the man, Iverson shattered the glass.

SENATORS DODGED.

Scared by Dr. Mary Walker—A Roosevelt Hoax.

Albany, March 19.—An attempt by Dr. Mary Walker to get introduced a bill providing for women to wear male dress, as she does by her own sweat suit, almost produced a stampede in the Senate to-day. She approached Senator Gledhill, Gledhill declared he would have to get the permission of State Chairman Woodruff before he would dare handle the bill. Mr. Woodruff, he said, was a suffragette, and as Dr. Walker wasn't he thought the permission would not be forthcoming. He advised her to consult Senator Travis.

WANT TIERNY PROMOTED.

Diners Boom Bronx Municipal Justice for Supreme Court.

John M. Tierney, municipal court justice of the 2d District, The Bronx, was praised last night for the excellence of his service of twelve years on the civil court bench and boomed for the Supreme Court at a dinner given to him and his colleagues, Justice Peter A. Shells, of the 1st District, The Bronx, at the Schermerhorn Club, avenue and 14th streets, yesterday.



NO. 5241—TISSEU PAPER PATTERN OF GIRL'S SACQUE NIGHTGOWN, FOR 10 CENTS.

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
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
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END OF SANATORIUM FIGHT.

Definitely Decided to Move Lakewood Institution to Hopewell. It was definitely decided yesterday that the Lakewood Tuberculosis Preventorium, which is located in the house once occupied by President Cleveland, in Lakewood, would be moved to Hopewell, a small town about six miles from Lakewood. The trustees have received a gift of a valuable farm in addition to the \$50,000 now in the treasury. The trustees plan to raise \$100,000 for new buildings. When completed the institution will accommodate about four hundred children, who will be taken care of without charge. The fund raised by the institution will be raised by popular subscription. The trustees will take care chiefly of children of tuberculous parents, keeping them out in the open air and away from infectious influences. The fund will be constructed in methods of keeping their homes sanitary.
