

STAKE FOR GUY FISHER

Wins Excelsior Handicap in Hard Drive with Fayette.

WEAK FINISH BY M'GEE

Big Crowd Enjoys Keen Racing and Summer Weather at Aqueduct Track.

Guy Fisher, running in the name and colors of E. W. Hoffman, won the Excelsior Handicap at Aqueduct yesterday in a stirring drive with S. C. Hill's Fayette. The four-year-old son of Saint-Apollonia, with Taplin in the saddle, raced right into the front at the start and held the post of only 100 yards and forcing the pace at the way stood off a challenge from Fayette in the last sixteenth and won by three parts of a length in the good time of 1:46 for the mile and a sixteenth. The race was worth \$2,000 to the winner.

Mr. Hillstead and to fact a number of good judges were not satisfied that the best horse was McGee was a bit unlucky, perhaps, and failed to hold his position on the far turn, while his finish was woefully weak. At the last sixteenth pole Fayette appeared to be running stronger than Guy Fisher, but in the drive that followed Taplin's more vigorous work counted on his mount's favor. Fayette won the race and the same pronounced with the crowd on the hillside, by the way, closed favorable at 5 to 10. Garner had the leg up on Firestone, but the horse broke badly and ran a dull race, as he could never improve his position.

Arasee ran his usual consistent race, coming from far back to earn third money. West showed a better position, perhaps. Off badly, he ran into fourth position on the turn, but was shut off half way down the stretch. Prince Ahmed had the confidence of his owner, H. G. Bedwell, but it looked as if he would not extend himself for Guy Burns until too late.

Mr. Hillstead was bemused after McGee's unsatisfactory ride on Fayette. The case against Carroll Shilling, who is charged with assaulting his employer, R. L. Thomas, will come up this week, possibly to-morrow. On the outcome depends the boy's getting a license to ride. The awards of the Aqueduct track are as follows: Guy Fisher, \$2,000; Fayette, \$1,000; Prince Ahmed, \$500; West, \$250; Arasee, \$125; Firestone, \$62.50; Taplin, \$31.25; McGee, \$15.62.

The first real touch of summer since the season opened, combined with the running of the Excelsior Handicap, long a feature of the Aqueduct meeting, attracted a big crowd to the track. The clubhouse incident was better postponed until the opening day of the big stand was completely filled, with an overflow on the lawn.

Among those seen on the clubhouse balcony was John E. Madden, the breeder and developer of so many good horses. It was his first appearance of the season, and he was busy most of the afternoon shaking hands with his friends. The experiment of waiting with Rose Queen and so conserving her great speed for a dash through the stretch did not work well in the second race. McGee, under instructions from her trainer, Sam Hillstead, took a gentle hold of her as the barrier was released and did his best to keep her quiet for the first time this year.

Madman, which established a new track record of 1:22 3/4 for six furlongs on Thursday, had a good race yesterday, but after coming in front most of the way could not withstand Beem's determined challenge at the end. Sixty carried the colors of Harry Payne Whitney for the first time this year. Ed Ball appears to thrive on racing. In spite of his hard struggle on Friday, when he was beaten by Wander, he came right back yesterday and beat Dullahan and others in the third event. Queen Marguerite's performance in this race was too good to be true. She won with much more ease than in the first time, but failed to show her usual speed when she found clear sailing.

E. C. Cooney, part owner with Ed Hoffman of Guy Fisher, winner of the Excelsior Handicap, took a lead in the selling race by hitting up Ed Ball \$200 over his own selling price of \$20. H. G. Bedwell established his horse for the customary advance of \$5.

Mrs. M. H. Selby's Kentucky Rose, a well bred filly by Orchestrate-St. Ursula, is not likely to prove a useful investment. She led during the running of the first race and could not get on her feet in the second race. A daughter of John Drake's Ort Wells gave Lola, the quoted favorite, quite a battle for half a mile and completely turned the tables on Winning Widow and Horizon, which finished far in front of her in recent races.

Charles Kessler, who purchased Uncle George Kessler, last year to start a breeding farm, will race a stable this year under the name of the Ramapo Stock Farm. His colors—black, blue, cross sashes, white sleeves, pink cap—were seen for the first time yesterday, when Adruche started with the red and white.

F. J. McNulty, president of the village of Faranoga Springs, was a visitor at the track.
