WAIF AWOKES IN MIDOCEAN

West Indian Orphan Fell Asleep Exploring Steamer's Hold.

Philip Ingraham looked as if he might be about six years old when he arrived here yesterday from Jamaica on the steamer Tagus. He wasn't sure of his age, but thought he might be nine. His mother told him a year ago that he was nine, and he thought it must be correct. He remembered that she had died in a but near Kingston a short while ago and his father had been killed in the recent earthquake.

The little fellow did not seem to have a care in the world as he told his story in the Ship News Office yesterday. He munched at one of the ship's bolters, and dangled his bare and dirty feet from a large chair. The little stowaway from Kingston just munched and dangled and innocently aroused enough sympathy from passersby to fill a small envelope with dimes and nickels.

No one cared for him, he said. He was merely a child of the beach, sleeping by the shore near Kingston at night and in the day doing errands for people of his own race. Hunger drove him to the steamship Tagus, and he went aboard. He found a few discarded biscuits in the hold, and after eating them fell fast asleep. He did not wake up until the steamer was some ten hours out from port.

Then Philip Ingraham came up on deck for a constitutional. It was colder at sea than on the beach at Jamaica, and his chief steward abbreviated a cadet's old uniform and gave it to the youthful stowaway. Philip was taken to Ellis Island yesterday and will be deported on the Tagus on Saturday.

HOE'S GIFT TO MRS. JOHNS

More Light on Claims Against Press Builder's Estate.

More light was thrown yesterday on the proceedings which Mrs. Margaret Johnson Johns has begun to collect \$20,000 from the estate of Robert Hoe, the manufacturer of printing presses. Mrs. Johns, whose home was in London, is now in this city. She was Mrs. Brown, a widow, when she came here last fall about a month after the death of Mr. Hoe. She was accompanied by her father, Major Claude Johnson, manager of the Hoe business in London. Last January she married Arthur Johns, a lawyer, whom she had interested in her claim against the Metropolitan Trust Company. She holds sixty-six shares of the company stock, which has a par value of \$100, which she says came legally into her possession from Mr. Hoe. She seeks now to have these shares placed on the books in her own name. The Metropolitan Trust Company demurred to her complaint, which the Supreme Court overruled.

On the death of her first husband, Mrs. Johns went to live with her father. Mr. Hoe spent much of his time in the last ten years in London. It was said that Mr. Hoe had made gifts to the then Mrs. Brown in securities amounting to \$20,000. He then had her turn back to him securities valued at \$10,000, for which he executed a bond as a claim on his estate and which she was to collect on his death. She now will proceed to collect on that bond, which the executors of the Hoe estate refused to recognize.

SUES GLEASON ESTATE.

The Peoples Trust Company of Brooklyn has begun its action in the Supreme Court against the executors and heirs of Joseph J. Gleason, who was a well known sporting man, for an accounting and permission to sell certain real estate to pay a lien of \$50,000 held by the plaintiff on the estate. Gleason in 1908 conveyed to the trust company all his realty holdings, on which the company was to collect rents and pay an income not exceeding \$10,000 a year. At his death the estate was to be divided among his children and grandchildren. The plaintiffs say that they paid out \$50,000 more than was received, which is a lien on the property, and that there is left only \$12,000.
