

NEW PLAN TO BE MADE

Offer of Part of Railway System Meets No Response. Next Sale to Include Property Embraced in Refunding Mortgage of 1902.

Because the whole Metropolitan Street Railway system was not included in the property offered for sale yesterday no bids were received. The sale was by order of the United States Circuit Court on foreclosure proceedings instituted by the Guaranty Trust Company, trustee for the \$1,000,000 5 per cent bonds.

The sale was to have taken place on the second floor of the Metropolitan Life Building, Madison Avenue and 24th Street.

Mr. Krauthoff, acting for George E. Trippe, chairman of the joint committee of bondholders, put up two checks for \$30,000 as security for any bid which might be made.

Mr. Krauthoff explained that the committee of bondholders was planning a reorganization and wished to wait until the foreclosure proceedings on the 4 per cent bonds had been completed.

The reorganizing mortgage, which was executed in 1902, in which the Morton Trust Company, now merged with the Guaranty Trust, was the trustee, is a second lien upon the property covered by the general collateral trust mortgage.

The sale, therefore, under the mortgage of 1902 would not convey to the purchaser the title to the entire property of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company.
