

SERVICES HELD FOR KING

British Representatives Gather in St. James's Church.

WHITE FLOWERS AT ALTAR

Bishop Courtney and Dr. Cadman the Speakers—Negroes Honor Ruler.

Special services in commemoration of King Edward were held in several churches in this city yesterday.

Many of the qualities which won especial distinction for the dead monarch were dwelt upon by Bishop Frederick Courtney, now rector of St. James's Church, and the Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, pastor of the Central Congregational Church, in Brooklyn, at the memorial services held in St. James's Church, Madison avenue and 71st street.

Overhead were suspended British, American, Canadian, Irish, Australian and Scotch flags. Through the gold, red and purple of the chancel windows streamed the afternoon sun.

Bishop Courtney recalled the American visit of the King when a young man and the hearty sympathy and appreciation he manifested on that occasion.

King's Democratic Affinity. "He has worthily been called the king maker of peace," he said. "Another attribute of greatness in him was the union of democratic affinity with faith in his king's prerogative."

Musical Features of Service. Among the musical numbers were Chopin's Funeral March and Handel's Dead March from "Saul." Organist Walter Henry Hall conducted the musical service.

Canadians at a Service. The Rev. Dr. Robert S. MacArthur conducted the memorial service to King Edward in the Calvary Baptist Church under the auspices of the Canadian Club of New York.

SERVICES FOR KING AT SEA Liners' Crews and Passengers Honor Edward's Memory.

When the White Star liner "Corde" left Liverpool a week ago Captain C. A. Bartlett ascertained the exact hour at which the funeral of King Edward would be held, and after he got out to sea he computed the time so that services could be held on board simultaneously with those in London.


VOTING FOR SENATORS IN SPAIN. Madrid, May 22.—Elections for Senators were held today, but there is no change in the Conservative character of the Senate.

DE LESSEPS DETAINED

PAPAL CROWN FOR MONASTERY

Czestochowa, Russian Poland, May 22.—Sixty thousand pilgrims from Russian and Austrian Poland attended the services today in connection with the consecration of the jeweled crown presented to the Pauline Fathers by the Pope to replace the crown which was stolen from the chapel of the monastery on October 22 last.

JEWISH WOMEN WIN RIGHTS

Students in Higher Courses Obtain Residence Outside of Pale.

St. Petersburg, May 22.—An important decision of the Senate affecting the Jewish question has just been published, in which the ruling is made that woman's higher educational courses which have been established in many cities are classified with university courses, and that the privilege of residence outside the pale is extended to such students on the same basis as to university graduates.


