YOUNG BROKER SELF-SLAIN

George Morgan Answers 'Phone Call, Then Shoots Himself.

NO MOTIVE DISCLOSED

Had Made a Fortune in Wall Street at Twenty-eight—Father Was Big Speculator.

George Morgan, a member of fashionable clubs and formerly a broker in Wall Street, killed himself yesterday morning in his bachelor quarters at the Mendelssohn apartments, No. 113 West 40th street.

Mr. Morgan, who was only twenty-eight years old, roomed with Matthew Morgan, his older brother, and Herman G. Von Rodenstein, a bond broker, of No. 80 Broad street.

Robert Wilson, the valet who attended after 9 o'clock to see to the wants of his employers. He tried the door of George Morgan's bedroom and found it locked.

The valet, however, climbed out of the window of Mr. von Rodenstein's bedroom to a little roof level with the sill, and made his way round to the window of Mr. Morgan's bedroom.

Vallet Gives the Alarm. The valet ran immediately to the bathroom and reported his discovery. He was dispatched post haste for the first physician he could find.

Mr. Von Rodenstein summoned William Laimbeer, of Bishop, Laimbeer & Co., brokers of No. 15 Wall street, a friend of Morgan's, who arrived at the apartment a few minutes before the young man's death.

Mr. Von Rodenstein said he and young Morgan had gone out together the night before to see a show and returned about 11:30 o'clock.

The Wrights to Enter. Will Take Part in All Contests Provisionally.



MAY CANCEL CAR ORDER. Rumor About N. Y. C. Denied, However, by Manufacturers.

The New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company, it was reported in Wall Street yesterday, has asked for the cancellation of extensive orders for freight cars, the amount involved being about \$6,000,000.

Comotive Company said that all the orders which that corporation had from the New York Central were well along toward completion and could not be cancelled, adding that he had not heard that the New York Central was withdrawing orders.

B. & O. ORDERS 1,000 CARS. Apparently Not Alarmed by Possible Rate Litigation.

Baltimore, June 2.—Despite pending federal rate litigation in the West and the possibility of similar action in the East, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad announced to-day that it had placed with the Standard Steel Company a contract for 1,000 steel frame freight cars of 30,000 pounds capacity, to be delivered in the fall, when a still greater increase in freight tonnage is expected.

ECUADOR AND PERU RESTLESS. Guayaquil, Ecuador, June 2.—The friction between Ecuador and Peru continues owing to the failure of the two republics to reach an agreement as a basis for mediation.
