COST DEPENDS ON PLACE

\$10,000,000 Would Pay for Ample Structure at Fort Washington Point.

The first steps toward the erection of the Hudson River Bridge were taken yesterday when the Phoenix Construction Company began borings at a point opposite West 17th street and about one mile north of Fort Lee.

The two state commissions have decided on two sites, one at 17th street and the other at 19th street, for boring operations to determine the nature of the rock which will be encountered when the foundations for the bridge will be laid.

Results of this investigation will be submitted by the bridge commission to the legislature of the respective states.

The commissions have been trying to ascertain the most advantageous site for the proposed bridge for the last three years in respect to both cost and the traffic advantages.
