

PLANS DEAF MUTE CHURCH

Father McCarthy Makes Promise in Sermon at St. Xavier's.

For the first time in history the deaf and dumb are to have a church of their own, where the sermons will be in the sign language.

This was announced at the mass for nudes celebrated in the Church of St. Francis Xavier yesterday morning by Father M. J. McCarthy, S. J.

Two hundred and fifty mutes of the Roman Catholic faith were present from New Jersey, Brooklyn, Staten Island, New Rochelle, Manhattan and The Bronx.

Father T. J. Purcell, S. J., of Baltimore, who has charge of the Jesuit mission for mutes in that city, and Father Joseph H. Rockwell, S. J., assistant provincial, were within the sanctuary.

For his sermon at the mass Father McCarthy took the story of the deaf mute healed by Jesus, and telling it to the people to whom he has consecrated his life, in sign language, he cheered them when he announced that before the year was at an end plans would be under way for the building of a church where all the services, with the exception of the mass itself, would be in the sign language.

As yet no funds have been subscribed for the work, but it is certain that when wealthy Roman Catholics learn that there are more than one thousand mutes of their own faith in New York City and vicinity subscriptions will come in quickly.

The Catholic deaf mutes have an association, of which John F. Bryan, a typotype operator, is president.

After church yesterday morning there was a luncheon for the mutes in the college building, followed by speeches in the sign language and general justification. Later all went to Fordham University, where all young and old, indulged in games on the campus, and in the evening had dinner.

READY FOR MIMIC WAR

Pine Camp Now Awaits Arrival of Militiamen.

REGULAR TROOPS THERE

Attempt to Capture Carthage and Attack on Watertown Likely.

Camp of Instruction, Pine Camp, N. Y., July 31.—Mimic war on what is likely to be the most extensive scale attempted since the Blue and Brown armies met at Manassas, Va., five years ago will begin here this week with the assemblage of United States regular troops and national guardsmen for the joint army and militia maneuvers.

With the arrival to-day of the last of the regular troops assigned for work in the maneuvers, which will continue during August, Pine Camp awaits the militiamen who, beginning early to-morrow morning, will pour into camp during the next three days.

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OLDFIELD WILLING TO RACE

Ordinarily I should not reply until I knew that the challenge was authentic, but New York promoters wired me to-day asking if I would race Johnson, and I have accepted the challenge."

THE BASEBALL OUTLOOK

Both Local Major League Teams Have Fighting Chances.

With half of the season gone the chances for either or both of the two New York major league teams winning a pennant are about even. The Yankees are in second place, with Pittsburgh right on their heels, and with only a few percentage points separating the two teams. Chicago has a comfortable lead. The Yankees started their Western trip in third place, but within half a game of the Boston Red Sox. As in the National League, the Athletics, leaders in the American League race, have now a fairly comfortable lead.

Yesterday Chicago added to her advantage in the National League race by taking two games from St. Louis, while the Giants remained idle. Beginning with this week, the Western clubs start another invasion of the East, and the Cubs will be here on Tuesday for a four-game series with the Giants. The result of these games may decide whether or not the latter will be a real pennant contender. To put themselves in the running again McGraw's men must win at least three out of the four. If they can capture the entire series the race will again be fairly close. It is reasonable to expect, however, that New York will gain on both Chicago and Pittsburgh while the latter are playing in the East.

GIANTS WIN IN THE TENTH
