The Republicans of Iowa are the best party in the Union. We indorse the Senators and Representatives whom they send to Congress...

The platform closes with an indorsement of the postal savings bank bill, suggesting, however, as did the Democratic platform recently adopted at Ottumwa...

The first test of strength came when Senator Dolliver was chosen permanent chairman over J. C. Maybray, the stalwart candidate, by a vote of 834 to 549.

Senator Cummins did not mention President Taft in his speech. He referred to the Republican party as the party of Lincoln, Grant, or Roosevelt...
