STRIKE NEGOTIATIONS OFF

The striking cloakmakers failed yesterday to reply to the offer of the Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Association for a tentative agreement, and as a result all negotiations were declared off. The manufacturers then prepared to fight the closed shop demand to the end. Julius Henry Cohen, on behalf of the manufacturers, said:

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Union and Non-Union Coat Tailors Quit Work in 300 Factories.

Another general clothing strike started unexpectedly yesterday, fifteen thousand coat tailors, of whom six thousand are women, quitting work in three hundred factories in a 24-hour working week and an increase in wages. About fifteen thousand more are expected to quit work to-day.
