EASY FOR MEADOW BROOK

Rockaway Soundly Beaten on Point Judith Polo Field.

BRYN MAWR FOUR A WINNER

Defeats New Haven in Close Match—Whitney, Out and Then In, Plays Fast Game.

(By Telegraph to The Tribune.) Narragansett, Aug. 6.—Meadow Brook, led by Harry Payne Whitney, and Bryn Mawr were the winning polo teams here today in the opening matches of the national senior championships on the field of the Point Judith Polo Club.

The match in which Meadow Brook and Rockaway met, which was the second staged on the field for the day, brought about some unpleasant consequences and ultimately a protest to the officials of the National Polo Association.

Because of the absence of Foxhall Keene, who was to have played No. 3 on Rockaway, there was more than an hour's delay in getting the match started.

At once Rockaway lodged a protest. So Harry Payne Whitney, rather than have his club disqualified, made a quick change by borrowing a polo outfit on the field and took his place.

As Malcom Stevenson was the centre of the storm of protest, the strange complication was further befogged when he changed his Meadow Brook colors and donned the blue of Rockaway and the name of Rockaway on his polo shirt.

At the same moment Harry Payne Whitney appeared in the ring he had obtained from F. A. Gill, the English player. The controversy was settled, and the match proceeded with Stevenson playing for Rockaway on the Polo Association ruling that, as Foxhall Keene was not on the field, it was proper for Stevenson to take his place.

In the game between New Haven and Bryn Mawr, the former was regarded as the probable winner, but proved ragged on team work.

At one time in a scrimmage he backed out of the game, but was quickly spotted by Alexander Brown, the No. 1 for Bryn Mawr.
