Record of Men Whose Operations Caused a National Bank Vice-President To Be Forced Out.





CHILDREN ATTENDING MASS IN ST. PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL YESTERDAY.

CHILDREN GET SHARE IN CONSECRATION WEEK

Brilliance of Wednesday's Pontifical Mass Reproduced for Little Ones.

3,000 FILL THE CATHEDRAL

Warm Praise for Their Singing Is Uttered by Archbishop Farley on Behalf of Papal Legate.

Cardinal Vannutelli celebrated pontifical mass, his first in this country, in the newly consecrated St. Patrick's Cathedral yesterday morning for the children of the archdiocese.

Not even the clergy were allowed to share in the procession of prelates and priests in their gorgeous robes preceding the mass those pressing the police lines saw endless troops of little girls and boys marshalled in the streets bounding the cathedral grounds by the Rev. Joseph P. Smith, superintendent of the parochial schools, and his assistants.

The boys and girls of St. Charles Borromeo's School, 424 1/2 street, near Eighth avenue, rode to the cathedral on two large platform trucks, which leather covered benches had been fastened, and enjoyed the outing more than a picnic.

As early as 8:30 o'clock, an hour before the time set for the service, the infant pilgrims began pouring into the vast church, marching two by two, silent and big eyed with awe.

By 10 o'clock, when the cathedral chimes began tolling forth the notes of the old hymn "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name," the dim arches of the temple spread over a sea of little faces, each one upturned and again, searching for the face of the priest.

When the eight thousand had finished swarming into the pews the brilliance of Wednesday's pontifical mass was reproduced for the children of the archdiocese.
