SAVANNAH'S AUTO PLANS

Postponement Assures Larger and Better Field of Starters.

RALPH MULFORD TO DRIVE

Light Cars Will Compete on November 11 for Savannah and Tiedeman Trophies.

The postponement of the Grand Prix automobile race to November 12 at Savannah has resulted in a much larger and better entry list than the affair which would have started at the Long Island Motor Parkway if the race had been decided there on October 15.

Three National cars have been entered. One will be driven by Aitken, who made such an excellent showing in the Vanderbilt and the Fairmount Park races.

The three flats, to be driven by Nazaro, De Palma and Wagner, will appear, and the three Benzes, Hemery will drive one of the Benzes, George Robertson may find that he is able to drive the second, and the third driver is a matter of some doubt.

Savannah is mightily pleased with the sanction. It allows the Savannah Automobile Club to run a race on Saturday, November 12, for light cars. The Savannah challenge trophy, now held by J. H. Tyson, whose Isotta-Fraschini, driven by Lewis Strang, won it in the spring of 1908, will be offered as the trophy for competition for the larger class of the higher class on the first day.

The Grand Prize race will be twenty-two rounds of a circuit of about 1.5 miles, making the total distance approximately 407 miles. The Vanderbilt was 275 miles. The entrant of the winning car will have the custody of the \$5,000 gold cup, now held by the Fiat Automobile Company, till the race is again contested.

Louis Wagner won the first Grand Prix race at Savannah in 1908 in a Fiat. Victory Hemery, in a Benz, was only 35 seconds behind the winner. The Fiat cars have been on the Moltke, which was detained several days at Quarantine, but which is now released. They will probably be shipped South on Saturday next.

The two men who leaped from the pit and who have been referred to as "dirty mechanics" were Robert Cleland, one of the Michelin Tire Company's firing force, and George Babcock, who is foreman of the engine testing station at the Alco factory.

The third man was Lee, who rides with Grant and who is a road tester at the Alco factory. It is agreed by all that the chief credit belongs to the Michelin Tire Company man, although each of the three worked as if controlled by one mind.
