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
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"HOBBLED."

800,000 CHILDREN PLAY

Bradstreet Reports This Year's Attendance Breaks All Records.

SUGGESTS IMPROVEMENTS

Playgrounds Should Be Fenced and Beautified, He Tells Commissioner Stover.

In a report of the playground work for the last season, which has just been submitted to Park Commissioner Stover by Howard Bradstreet, the Supervisor of Recreation, the fact that 800,000 children were in attendance during June, July, August and September is said to be an indication that organization of the playgrounds work should have been done years ago.

According to Mr. Bradstreet, the term "playground" like the term "park," has as yet an indefinite meaning. This was evidenced, he said, by the criticism which followed the opening of new centres in some of the parks, many citizens deeming the damage that would result to the grass.

"In some of these cases," said Mr. Bradstreet in his report, "notably in Corlears Hook and Mulberry Bend parks, the grass had already seriously deteriorated. No apparatus was placed on the lawns in any of the parks where play centres were established, but play leaders introduced games. There was already a scattered use of the grounds, but the leaders attracted many other children. The success of these plays as play centres was unquestioned. The damage done to the grass in some of them was finally conspicuous.

"The final result in the matter of these new play centres, therefore, was unsatisfactory, inasmuch as there were two opposing interests, one centring about the children and the other centring about the grass. The former was gratified and applauded and the latter was shocked.

"By the erection of a proper fence artistically banked on both sides, the introduction of proper artistic shelters and buildings and the installation of apparatus, a playground is established which is a pleasure to the eye, in harmony with the surroundings, even in the most exclusive parts, and gives the widest opportunities for the enjoyment of children. Such treatment is the standard one in Chicago, but is unknown in the outdoor playgrounds of New York.

Mr. Bradstreet recommended to Commissioner Stover that at least one or more such centres should be established in New York to acquaint the public with the proper meaning of the word "playground" in connection with park.

"In other things," Mr. Bradstreet asked that the playgrounds be protected from hoodlums.

"The fenced-in grounds of the department," he said, "are fenced in, while others are not. The purpose of a fence around a playground is to keep out those who do not belong in it, whether during the day or after hours. For example, in Hamilton Park the boys' and girls' playgrounds are enclosed with a fence five feet high. The Bureau of Recreation is responsible for the city property within the inclosures. Its attendants and leaders leave by 9 o'clock at night. Up to that time order prevails, but after that the hoodlums, sometimes a hundred or more, jump over the fence, and then a reign of destruction begins. Before the Park Department can expect the police to protect its property it must itself make protection feasible. The only alternative is to keep watchmen and patrolmen on duty four hours in the day."

Mr. Bradstreet asked that the schedule of pay for the play leaders be increased. In an effort to increase interest in folk dances, he says, the city should purchase two hundred dollars, one to remain below 42d street and the other above.

OPPORTUNITIES IN CHINA

Dr. Reid Says America Stands in Highest Esteem There.

The Rev. Dr. Gilbert Reid, of the International Institute of China, in a sermon at the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn, yesterday morning spoke of "Present Opportunities in China."

The action of this country in returning a portion of the Boxer indemnity and the efforts of President Taft and the different secretaries of state to secure fair play and the "open door" for the trade of all countries, has convinced the Chinese officials and the people that Americans are the ones to look to for assistance and even national preservation.

Dr. Reid said that China has commodities which we need and may buy, and that the United States has commercial ideas and methods which China needs. The International Institute of China has a committee composed of prominent Chinese merchants and merchants of other countries who confer as to the best means for breaking down the barriers to trade.

The primary object of the organization is to get the Italians in this country out of the cities and into the farming districts. Special efforts to free the emigrants from the clutches of the padrones are aimed at by the Italia Gens. The Archbishop of New York and other high Catholic prelates have endorsed the work of the organization.
