

ROOSEVELT TO "HIT HARD"

Back from New England, He Starts Upstate-In Great Fettle.

ENTERS THICK OF CAMPAIGN

Prentice Plans Strenuous Trip and Many Talks in City with Stimson.

Chairman Prentice of the Republican State Committee conferred for several hours yesterday with Mr. Roosevelt in regard to the progress of the campaign and the plans for the future.

The result was that Mr. Roosevelt has been scheduled to speak at nine meetings in Manhattan on October 21 with Henry L. Stimson.

Chairman Prentice Optimistic.

Chairman Prentice returned to state headquarters, and after several hours of hard work got back to the Union League Club, from which he went to see Mr. Roosevelt.

Chairman Prentice said last night that he thought the day was not what it should be among business men was wanting all the time—that there was less of it now than there was right after the Republican convention.

Trying to Arouse Labor Men. "I am informed," said the state chairman, "that the Democratic State Committee has sent an official of this city to Albany, Syracuse, Buffalo, Oswego, Rochester, Elmira and Lewis."

Lending Support to Stimson. As to the campaign that is being made by William Randolph Hearst, Chairman Prentice said it was calculated to aid Mr. Stimson and the Republican ticket.

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CURRAN TURNING THE 11TH

Republican Fights Hard in Old Tammany Stronghold.

Henry H. Curran, the Republican candidate for Congress from the 11th Congressional District, who has also the Independence League nomination, has started a fight in that district which gives promise of defeating for the first time in the history of the district the Tammany nominee.

Curran is speaking on almost every street corner of the district, which runs from 59th street to Christopher street, on the West Side. Along with his repeated challenges to Fornes for a debate, Curran is offering two prizes, the first a \$1 bill to any one who can prove that he has talked and shaken hands with Fornes within the last six months and a \$5 bill to any one who has been directly benefited by the services at Washington of the Tammany Congressman.

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MELLEN TO ROOSEVELT

Railroad President Resents Remarks in New Hampshire.

Will Keep His Promise Says That It Was Not Made Contingent on Robert P. Bass's Election.

Mr. Roosevelt spoke of the recent statement of Mr. Mellen that thereafter the railroads of which he is the head would take no part in politics in New Hampshire, and told the people that while he was glad that Mr. Mellen had said what he did, they ought to see to it that the railroads kept out of politics in the future, not because they wished to, but because they had to.

What I said at Concord last Thursday night, I said without equivocation," said Mr. Mellen to the Tribune correspondent to-night at his home in Stockbridge. Mr. Mellen did not seem angered, but he made this statement in answer to the remarks made by the former President on his Bass campaigning tour of New Hampshire on Saturday.

Mr. Mellen's promise to keep the Boston & Maine out of New Hampshire politics was not contingent upon the election of Mr. Bass, as Roosevelt implied. When I say that the Boston & Maine will be kept out of politics I mean it, and it will be kept out of politics in the campaign as well as in the future.

From what I understand Mr. Roosevelt, whether intentionally or not, in his speech yesterday left the impression with his hearers that my promise to the people of New Hampshire depends upon the election of Mr. Bass for his fulfillment. In other words, if Bass is elected, I will be honest, and if Carr is elected I will be a liar.

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PORTUGAL NOT YET QUIET

Government Uneasy Regarding the Attitude of Troops.

MILITARY POWER ASKED Monarchist Officeholders Want to Retain Posts—To Separate Church and State.

Lisbon, Oct. 23.—The Republican government is somewhat uneasy over the attitude of the regiments which made the revolution possible. Although not openly insubordinate, the soldiers, flushed with victory, are showing extreme independence, and are championing the maintenance of strong power in the hands of the military.

The government's real reason for according leave of absence for four months to the soldiers who took part in the rising, with full pay, is the desire to break up the regiments temporarily, and remove the danger of a military rebellion.

The Minister of Justice is framing a bill looking to the separation of Church and State. The Republican press says that the presence of Monsignor Masella, whom Monsignor Tonti, the papal nuncio, left on guard at the nunciature when he departed for Rome, is a parallel case to that of Monsignor Montagnini, ex-secretary of the papal nunciature at Paris, who was expelled from France, and insists that, like Montagnini, Monsignor Masella should be expelled.

Chicago, Oct. 23.—"I have said often enough that we wouldn't do any squealing if they beat us, and I don't intend to do any now. We were beaten four games out of five, and I will let the figures talk for themselves. If any one wants to say Connie Mack has a better ball club than I have, I will let him say it and I won't try for a come-back. The Cubs were beaten. They have been beaten before, but I think they have made a record of which any one would be proud. They demonstrated in Saturday's game that they wouldn't quit, and that's a big comfort. There are other years to come, and we will be on hand next season to fight our hardest and to strive for the National League pennant and what comes after. I hope the Athletics will win in the American League, for I want another chance at them."

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
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THE NEW KING OF SIAM

CHOLERA AMONG INSANE Many Deaths in Asylum at Aversa—Cause in the Provinces.

Rome, Oct. 23.—Seven deaths from cholera have occurred in the last twenty-four hours among the patients in the asylum for the insane at Aversa, in the province of Caserta, a short distance from Naples. The mortality at this asylum has been very high for the last two weeks, and a majority of all the patients have succumbed to the disease.

CABINET CRISIS IN GREECE. Athens, Oct. 23.—The Cabinet formed only a few days ago by Deputy Venizelos has resigned. The resignation of the Ministry was due to the fact that on every attempt to get a vote of confidence in the National Assembly a majority of the members refused to be present.

FUNERAL OF D. B. HILL Arrangements Completed in Albany—Body to Lie in State.

Albany, Oct. 23.—Arrangements for the funeral of David B. Hill were completed to-day. The body will be taken to-morrow morning from Wolfert's Roost, the late Senator's home, to St. Peter's Church, where it will lie in state in the tower room.
