

OBERMEYER WINS RACE

Good Contests Mark Events at St. Patrick's Games. M'GRATH IN RARE FORM

Tosses 56-Pound Weight in Exhibition Higher than the Old Record.

George J. Obermeyer, the crack distance runner of the National Athletic Club, ran a pretty race, defeating a large field in the three mile handicap run which featured the annual games of the St. Patrick's Junior Holy Name Society, held on Pratt Institute Field, Brooklyn, yesterday.

McGrath, in exhibiting his prowess with the 56-pound weight in an exhibition, tossed it 52 feet 8 inches, from a six-foot circle a few inches beyond the old record. He also threw from the seven-foot circle and an unlimited run and follow.

Frank Finegan, the national outdoor hop, step and jump champion, won the one hundred-yard dash, followed by Catholic Athletic League athletes. The race resulted in a close finish, Finegan winning by inches from James J. Bohan, of the Xavier Athletic Association.

THREE BURGLARS CAUGHT



OFFICER OF MASSACHUSETTS HIDE ASSOCIATION UNDER \$25,000 BAIL

Boston, Nov. 8.—Charged with the larceny of hides and notes valued at \$28,900, Isaac H. R. Porter, formerly treasurer of the Massachusetts Hide Corporation, was arrested to-night and later committed to the city jail. The complainant is Walden F. Brown of the firm of Brown Brothers (Limited), the Massachusetts Hide Corporation went into the hands of a receiver on September 12.

A COLORED CONVICT KILLED

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 8.—John Jones, colored, sent from Clark County for murder, was shot to death by a white man, identified to-day by James Rigo, white, an insane convict from Lorain County under a life sentence for murder. The men got into a fight in the dining room at dinner and continued it in the yard, Rigo finally severing Jones's jugular vein.

FIREMEN HURT AT DUNKIRK

Dunkirk, N. Y., Nov. 8.—Several firemen and a little girl were injured here to-day in a fire thought to have been incendiary in origin. Four business blocks were partially destroyed. A number of persons living in one of them narrowly escaped death. Overcome by smoke, they were rescued by firemen, one of whom and an eight-year-old girl were carrying fell from a ladder. Both were seriously injured. The property loss was about \$50,000.

DECLINES DEAD MAN'S DINNER
