

CORNELL MAKES GAME

BUT LOSING FIGHT

Pennsylvania Strikes Hard When Chances Arise in Football Struggle.

MERCER A POWER WITH BALL

Quakers Score Two Touchdowns, While Butler Kicks Two Goals from Placement for Cornell.

[By Telegraph to The Tribune.] Philadelphia, Nov. 24.—Pennsylvania defeated Cornell in their yearly football struggle on Franklin field, here today, by a score of 12 to 6.

Pennsylvania scored two touchdowns and their resultant goals for a total of 12 points. Cornell scored two goals from placement for a total of 6 points.

Mercer dashed around Cornell's right end for thirty-two yards and a touchdown before the game was five minutes old.

Ramsell kicked the ball on the 45-yard line, but the sudden strike, which had stamped some teams, but the Cornell men were made of sterner stuff, and they came back so hard that the Quakers were soon fighting desperately on the defensive.

Mercer dashed around Cornell's right end for thirty-two yards and a touchdown before the game was five minutes old.

Other men on both elevens played well, among whom may be mentioned Captain Cozens; Ramsell, the intercollegiate champion sprinter; Hough, Scott and Marks, for Pennsylvania, and Butler, Munk, Nichols, O'Connor, O'Rourke and Champagne, for Cornell.

Substitutions were made thick and fast in the second half. None of the players were seriously injured, but the desire of the coaches to bolster up some weak spot by sending in fresher men led to Cornell making fourteen changes and Pennsylvania eleven.


A few seats were vacant on one end of the field, but the crowd was big enough and enthusiastic enough to make plenty of noise and lend plenty of color.

Pennsylvania gained 200 yards by straight rushing, to 225 for Cornell, but the latter figure do not include a 20-yard run by Munk after recovering the ball on a punt.

It was only a moment, however, as on the first line-up Mercer dashed Cornell's right end, and running thirty-two yards, placed the ball directly behind the goal posts.

Cornell at once took the initiative, and after an exchange of two punts Seagrave interfered with one of the Pennsylvania backs who was trying to catch the ball, and Ervich, snapping it up, ducked away from several tacklers, and ran across the goal line for a touchdown.

With that chance gone it was punt, punt, punt to the end, Cornell had just started an advance on a pretty 35-yard end run by Nichols and a forward pass from Butler to Pletcher which netted fifteen more yards when the game was over.
