

REVENUE MEN SEIZE "COUNTERFEIT" CIGARS

Raid Restaurants Charged with Selling Cheap Smokes in Boxes of Costly Brands.

PROSECUTIONS TO FOLLOW

Government Loses in Taxes, Say Officials, While Manufacturers Profess Loss of \$600,000 in Business Yearly.

Officers of the internal revenue secret service made a series of raids in the course of last week on nearly a dozen well known restaurants and cigar stores in Manhattan and Brooklyn, and seized large quantities of cigars said to be counterfeit makes of the registered brands of Romeo y Julieta, Hoyo de Monterrey, La Carolina and Belinda cigars.

The seizures were made after a long investigation and on evidence gathered principally on behalf of the manufacturers of these brands by the Trade Mark Protective Company, of No. 141 Broadway. How extensive the practice of substituting cheap cigars attired in a counterfeit band of the real make has grown was shown by the statement made yesterday by J. M. Boteler, president of the Trade Mark Company, who said the total of Romeo y Julieta Perfectos now offered for sale throughout the United States exceeded the total output of the factory of the real brand during its whole existence. The loss sustained by the manufacturers of the four cigar brands mentioned, Mr. Boteler said, was estimated at from \$400,000 to \$600,000 a year, besides the great loss in reputation caused through the substitution in the trade of cigars considerably inferior to the makes protected by these marks.

The raids created a sensation in the trade. No doubt was left by the agents of the internal revenue service that their present efforts were only the beginning of the first and largest campaign of that kind ever seen in New York. Great as the loss of the manufacturers was admitted to be, the United States government has also a claim to recover at least part of the revenue that has been lost through these fraudulent practices.

Direct Loss of Revenue.

The most direct loss of revenue arises through the fact that the spurious cigars are sold in boxes which originally contained the genuine brands, and, having passed through the customs upon importation, had paid the revenue tax and were sealed with the revenue stamp. This stamp costs 20 cents for each box of one hundred cigars, and it is estimated that the government has lost thousands of dollars through the re-filling of stamped boxes with cigars that never passed through the internal revenue office.

Civil and criminal proceedings will be brought by the authorities to recover the loss sustained by the government and to prevent the continuation of the newly discovered abuse. Entirely independent from those official proceedings the manufacturers of the brands involved will bring suits for damages running into thousands of dollars in the state courts as well as in the United States Circuit Court. Most of the smaller cases will be brought before the Municipal Court under a section of the state laws, which may enable the complainants to recover damages, with the provision of jail penalties in cases in which judgment obtained are not satisfied.

In the string of raids made the following restaurants and cigar stores suffered seizures of spurious stock:

Archambault Restaurant, 102d street and Broadway, where considerable quantities of alleged inferior cigars were found in boxes of Romeros and other brands.

The Hotel Albany, at Broadway and 41st street, was the next place invaded by revenue inspectors. A large assortment of Romeros, Hoyos and Carolinas was confiscated.

The Monolith Cafe, in West 25th street, gave up considerable quantities of alleged fake Romeo Perfectos and Invincibles, as well as Carolinas and Belindas. Desvernino & Co., at No. 45 Beaver street, were well supplied with alleged counterfeit Romeros, Hoyos and Carolinas, and Frae & Graf, restaurant keepers, at No. 130 Third avenue, are alleged to have been stocked with fake Hoyos.

The Stag Cafe, at No. 27 East 27th street, was also visited and a large assortment of alleged fake Carolinas, Romeros and Belindas confiscated.

One of the richest hauls made was that at Goldschlager Brothers', at No. 10 Corlandt street, where alleged counterfeits of all the brands mentioned were seized.

Hickey, Kaplan & Witzek, of No. 165 Fifth avenue, Brooklyn, who were raided last Friday, were alleged to have had in stock large quantities of fake Romeros, Belindas and Carolinas, which were promptly seized.

Harry Sobel, of No. 2052 Eighth avenue, Manhattan, and Sontag Brothers, of No. 429 Fulton street, Brooklyn, completed the chain of places where alleged spurious cigars were confiscated.

Sales of Genuine Brands Reduced.

The first suspicion gleaned of the spreading practice came through the falling off in purchases of the four brands by places which previously had been heavy buyers of the real articles. Complaints from smokers helped to strengthen the suspicion.

Upon investigation it was found that practically the same method was adopted by all the dealers emmeshed, and that the motive was to secure larger profits.

The Romeo y Julieta Perfectos, for instance, which sell at retail at 25 cents apiece, are sold wholesale at \$19 a hundred to large purchasers and at \$19.50 to smaller ones. The cigars substituted for them cost, fake bands and all, \$11 a hundred, and some of them are said to be worth as little as 7 or 8 cents apiece, being entirely made of Porto Rican tobacco. Thus the dealer using the fake brand could pocket a profit of 14 cents or more on each cigar, whereas he could make 6 cents or less only on the genuine cigars.

The original band has many secret marks, known only to very few people, and by means of these marks the finest imitation can be easily discovered.

CUSTOMS MEN CAUSE TEARS

Questioned on Pier, Woman Tells of Domestic Troubles.

Mrs. Grace V. Breckenridge, of South Orange, N. J., arrived here yesterday on the American line steamship Philadelphia from Southampton, and burst into tears while the customs inspectors were examining her baggage. Although the inspectors had no interest in her personal affairs, the questions arising in connection with the examination of her two trunks revealed a domestic breach that had occurred some weeks ago in London. Her declaration blank was made out for "Mrs. Grace V. Breckenridge and two children." Her trunks contained children's clothing, but no children had accompanied her across the Atlantic and the customs men became curious. Mrs. Breckenridge was the only person of that name on the Philadelphia and the inspectors asked her to produce the children. She was unable to do so, and then, with tears rolling down her cheeks, she told the inspectors that the children had been taken away by their father shortly before she sailed for New York. She said she left this city for London in October.

Her trunks were then passed and were sent to South Orange. Mrs. Breckenridge was met at the pier by a woman said to be her sister and by two men, all of whom accompanied her from the pier. One of the men was marked "G. V. B., South Orange, N. J." Mrs. Breckenridge went last night to the home of her father, Mervin M. Armstrong, a paper manufacturer, who lives at No. 186 Scotland Road, East Orange. Leroy Armstrong, her brother, said that Mrs. Breckenridge was a little misunderstanding abroad between a sister and her husband, Hunter G. Breckenridge, of Pineville, Va. He said that Mr. Breckenridge left England with the two children and a nurse two weeks ahead of his wife and is now in Virginia. He said Mrs. Breckenridge would join her family to-day.

PACKERS WANT REHEARING

Assert Recent Decisions Have Nullified Sherman Anti-Trust Law.

Chicago, June 3.—J. Ogden Armour and other meat packers charged with conspiracy in restraint of trade filed in the United States District Court here to-day written arguments citing the recent oil and tobacco decisions as ground for a rehearing on the motion to quash the indictments in the meat cases. According to the briefs, the new construction which the federal supreme court has given to the Sherman anti-trust law makes that statute too indefinite for enforcement in a criminal prosecution, and, if the contrary were true, has rendered the indictments against the meat packers wholly insufficient. The "test of reason" is declared by the packers to be a variable test, not in itself a fixed standard.
