In Final Effort Humidity Helps to Snuff Out Thirty-eight More Lives.

Mercury Doesn't Reach 90. Through the morning the temperature rose slowly until it reached the maximum of 87 degrees at noon, and hung there for another hour.

Especially in the office buildings was the oppression felt. In the streets there was an alleviating breeze, a wind that carried promise for the future and a look in the skies of storms to come.

Heat Kills Twenty-One Philadelphia Has 89 Fatalities Due to Hot Wave.

Philadelphia, July 7.—Twenty-one additional victims were claimed by the heat here to-day, bringing the total number of deaths during the present hot spell to eighty-nine.
