

CRASH IN RUSH HOURS

Shuttle Rams Sixth Avenue Train Carrying Crowds to Work.

An accident similar in character to the disaster which happened on September 11, 1905, at the curve of the elevated railroad at Ninth avenue and 53d street, occurred yesterday, when a seven-car southbound Sixth avenue train was rammed by a shuttle car just as it rounded the curve from 53d street into Sixth avenue.

Unlike the accident of 1905, when twelve people were killed and forty-two were injured, yesterday's mishap, although spectacular, caused no deaths and only one injury, which was not serious.

The shuttle train missed the switch at the corner on its way down from the 53d street terminal, and was thrown back across the tracks by the impact, and traffic was blocked for more than two hours.

The accident occurred at the helter-skelter of the morning rush hour, when a car train in charge of John McCarthy, motorman, and John Rensgen, conductor, left the 155th street terminal and started on its run to the South Ferry. The cars were crowded before the train reached 125th street, and from there on downtown the straphangers were outnumbered by people who were wedged in the aisles and on the platforms.

As the train approached 53d street it slowed down through 53d street and swung around for the curve into Sixth avenue.

The first car into the curve into the station, and a motorman was unable to see the shuttle car until it was running alongside the train on the northbound track. As it struck the switch, an automatic affair, instead of slowing up or going ahead on the northbound, it veered sharply around and plunged obliquely into the fourth car of the Sixth avenue train.

At the moment of the crash, all sides, and short circuits flashed on all sides, and quantities of splintered glass, fire sparks from the third rails and long splinters of broken woodwork flew about, causing a stampede of traffic in the street below.

Mrs. Marie Levine, of No. 201 West 150th street, was cut about the head by flying glass. She was taken to the West 83d street station, where her wounds were dressed, and then she went home, and other passengers escaped with bumps and bruises.

Superintendent Smith of the traffic division, with several other officials of the road, and an investigation of the causes of the accident, with a view to placing the blame. The police said a new switch had been installed at the curve on Tuesday and that this failed to work properly. This was not confirmed by the company's men. The whole damage was estimated at about \$300.
